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Deep Throat Revealed

The best-kept secret in Washington was revealed yesterday. W. Mark Felt, a high-ranking FBI official during the Nixon administration, was "Deep Throat" -- the source informing Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein's reporting of the Watergate Scandal.
