# **GVSU Honors Longtime Padnos Support**

The GVSU Board of Control has named GVSU's School of Engineering and a new science building in honor of Seymour and Esther Padnos of Holland.

"Seymour and Esther Padnos have been longtime friends and supporters of GVSU, and of our Science and Engineering programs in particular," said President Arend D. Lubbers. "The university is showing its gratitude to them for their willingness to support the state institution which serves the area in which they live and in which their business provides services so important to the local economy," Lubbers ex-plained.

The soon-to-be-completed east wing of the science complex, now the Seymour and Esther Padnos Hall of Science, will house a majority of the university's Science and Mathematics programs including Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Health Sciences and Geology.

According to Dean of Science and Mathematics Doug Kindschi, Padnos was a prime mover in establishing the Engineering program and influenced the curriculum's environmental component. "He urged us to create the Padnos Prize, an international

award given annually by the School of Engineering. It provides recognition to engineers who do the best job of designing products which have a major positive impact on the environment," Kindschi said.

### Record Number Attend GVSU This Summer

Grand Valley reached a record enrollment of 6,151 students for the 1995 Spring/Summer session, a 9.8 percent increase from last summer. "Grand Valley has been the state's fastest growing university for many years and this session's record enrollment shows that the trend continues," said Lynn M. Blue, registrar. "Our gains are significant because they are spread over different class levels, indicating that Grand Valley is successfully fulfilling the educational needs of a broad variety of students."

Blue noted that the largest increase, almost 46 percent, was in the number of freshmen enrolled. The

number of juniors increased by 21 percent, and the number of graduate students increased by 18 percent.

### GVSU Hosts Seminar Promoting Cultural Awareness between U.S. and Japan

GVSU faculty and staff are invited to attend a full-day seminar, titled "The Global Environment, Nature, Man and Societies: Challenges and Opportunities," which will be held on Monday, August 21. 
