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

my heart and tug at my seams...


CalmnessSweet Calmness

#### ACADEMIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

I am Ken Everingham and together with Ron Potter-Efron we are the T.J.C. Academic Affairs Committee. We will meet once a week to take care of the following details as they come up: First,1.) we will approve specializations (usually 45 credits) and finalize them. It is also our job to 2.) approve graduation logs. Third,3.) we approve student teachers of student taught classes which the cirriculum committee clears. Fourth,4.) we may grant waivers, for instance, to the requirement that 60 or 75% of all credits must be taken at T.J.C.

#### ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE

There are three people on the Admissions Committee; Dan Andersen, Jim Nelson, and I. We meet every Friday at 9:00 in Mr. Nelson's office in the Seidman House. We go over applications of students wishing admission to TJC. Many are internal transfers. We decide if they are accepted or not, or if they should be held for more information. The requirement of an essay can be waived in certain cases. The admissions standards are getting more selective, to insure that TJC gets desirable students.

# STUDENT SENATE

T.J.C. is represented in the All College Student Senate by Margaret Burns, a Senior and Chairperson of the Allocations Committee, Rich Gustafson, a Junior and Chairperson of the Appointments Committee, and Steve Oliver, also a Senior and member of the Programming Committee. As representatives of T.J.C., they are committed to letting the student body know what is happening on the All College level. They are also a part of the Coordinating Committee, along with Barb Glesner who is our representative on the All College ECS Committee, and the designated people who are chairpeople of the various committee's within the internal governance body of T.J.C. This is to insure open communication between the student body on all levels of activities, and the people who are participating in these activities.

On October 25, 1978, President Arend Lubbers gave a speech to the Student Senate regarding the "State of the College." Along with ex-

pressing his desire for Grand Valley to attain "University Status", he also had some very interesting things to sav about T.J.C.! The way he lead into his discussion of T.J.C. was quite interesting also. He began by talking about the necessity of keeping all the programs we now have in the Federation of Colleges on the Grand Valley Campus. However, this becomes a problem when an educational idea "goes outof-style" such as at T.J.C.. In our heyday, we had over 700 students, but this number has drastically dropped to about 300! Thus, we had an excess of faculty and programs that were costing the Colleges a lot of money! He stated that he believes that 300 is a good number for T.J.C., and that this number would assure stability in our school. It will also help to regulate the new admits so that the standards of our school will remain high. As for the rumors of closing down T.J.C., this is what he said, "We should close down any school that has become academically irresponsible. Even through the chaos of last year, T.J.C. has never been irresponsible academically. I am committed to T.J.C. as long as it works, and we have to give it a real chance! Among the other things I found this most intriduing.

However, he expressed his views on many other things. He said he agrees with the new representation of the Student Senate. Before, the Student Govern ent was not representative, and it was hard to take just a few people seriously. This year he "believes we will be taken seriously" He also addressed the issues of the Dome, a new track and stadium, the drop of enrollment, the changing over to the Semester system in the Fall of 1980, and the importance of student input on College affairs.
