 - -- I plan to teach painting and areas related to the visual arts, including philosophy, aesthetics, and the creative consciousness and unconsciousness. In short, I want to help students experiment and find themselves through the vehicle called Art.
 - -- TJC expresses the concept of personal freedom and responsibility. It is a place where one can look in depth at a subject, take it as far as one wants, go beyond the boundaries of the class; a place where one can become positive in a sometimes negative world; a place where the process of learning is just as important as the product. In other words, I'm just as interested in how the painting is developed as I am in the final outcome.
 - -- At TJC I can instruct the way I always wanted to. In Art an equalization takes place between the student and the teacher; they become one, "sympatico," in the pursuit of knowledge; and the only difference between teacher and student is, perhaps, experience.
 - -- A person must become one with the object of his art, get inside it, feel it, know it, then interpret it visually. Often the subconscious takes over, or the intuitive process becomes active: then the process reaches a higher plane.
 - -- Many people say it takes a lifetime to become an Artist; I concur. When one reaches the point in his/her work of being satisfied, then most likely he/she is through developing as an artist.
 - -- I want to teach and explore many areas of art at TJC; I feel that here one is limited in his education only by his imagination.
