Joseph Preston, professor of history, wrote an article entitled "The English Water Bailiff: A Seventeenth Century Example," which was published in the July issue of Local History.

Pierre Robert, professor of French, has written an article entitled "Les Cent Cahiers de la Recherche" which appears in the September issue of the Magazine Litteraire, a Parisian monthly. During the past year, Robert has had three other articles, as well as book reviews and notes, published or accepted for publication.

This past summer Robert taught a graduate seminar at the Sorbonne

dealing with Proust's manuscripts. Earlier this year he was awarded a "Doctorat d'Etat es Lettres," his second degree from the University of Paris-Sorbonne.

James Scott, associate professor of physical education, earned a specialist degree in physical education from Central Michigan University in May. His thesis, entitled "Performance Characteristics and Field Test Validation for High Ability Wrestlers," was a research project conducted during the World Cup Wrestling Team Trials hosted by GVSC in March.
