FALL ENROLLMENT UP

Enrollment is up 8.2% this fall. Preliminary figures show an enrollment of 7,250 students compared to 6,700 last fall. Students have enrolled for a total of 77,200 credit hours, an increase of nearly 6,000 hours over last year's figures, according to Robert Fletcher, Dean of Academic Services.

There are over 2,500 new students this fall, including first time college attendees and transfer students. Even though high schools in the state graduated 9,000 fewer students than last year, GVSC's freshman enrollment is up 6.2%, with a total class size of 2,368 students.

Fletcher attributes the enrollment hike to increased public awareness of the college's programs and to streamlined recruitment efforts throughout the state.

Enrollment for summer session was up slightly, 1.4%, for the summer 1984 session, with 2,711 students enrolled.

ACROSS CAMPUS

Safety & Security Officers Ratify Three Year Contract

Contract negotiations have resulted in ratification of a new three-year agreement between the college and the Safety and Security Officers, represented by the Fraternal Order of Police, according to Tom Butcher, assistant to the Personnel Officer. Included in the settlement were: a 6% increase in wages in each of the three years, plus some equity adjustments; an increase in shift pay; and an increase in the uniform cleaning allowance. Also, the college agreed to continue the same fringe benefit package, including anticipated cost increases.

"We had some candid discussions regarding the concerns that each of us had and reached an agreement that realistically addresses those concerns. We are all pleased that we could reach agreement before the previous contract expired on September 30," said Butcher. "It's a good contract for all of us."

Contract Talks With COT Association Begin

Contract negotiations with the Clerical, Office, Technical Association (MESPA/MEA/NEA) were scheduled to begin last Thursday, September 27. The previous contract, which expired September

30, was for two years. "We will be bargaining on all issues, both economic and non-economic," said Tom Butcher, assistant to the Personnel Officer. "In the past, bargaining has been a lengthy process. While we had hoped to reach a new agreement before the expiration date, it is my impression that the Association felt the time was better spent in preparations and that bargaining can now move quickly. We hope this is correct and that we can reach an agreement covering our 141 clerical, office and technical employees soon," Butcher added.

Stage 3 to Offer Shakespeare Production

Stage 3 Theatre will perform Shakespeare's tragicomedy "Measure for Measure" at 8 p.m. in the Louis Armstrong Theatre on October 12, 13, 18, 19, and 20; and at Fountain Street Church in Grand Rapids at 8 p.m. on November 2, 3, 9, and 10.

The drama develops the themes of vice, virtue, and Christian mercy in the mythical city of Vienna. The Duke of Vienna empowers his deputy, Angelo, to rule the city while the Duke travels abroad. He knows Angelo to be stern and hopes that he will enforce laws which the Duke has ignored during his own reign. The Duke, however, craftily disguises himself and secretly looks on as Angelo begins by sentencing to death anyone found guilty of fornication. As the Duke watches from behind the scenes, he discovers that Angelo, too, is quilty of certain crimes.

The Stage 3 production will use a boxing ring as the setting.

Designer Jill Hamilton believes this will be an excellent metaphor for

the struggles between the characters, while highlighting their conflicts. She has designed Edwardian period costumes for the play to free the action from a strictly Renaissance historical context, and hopes to force the audience into a fresh appraisal of the play's issues. Fountain Street choir director and organist Beverly R. Howerton will provide musical accompaniment, using a selection of period music to enhance the moods of the drama.

Director Roger Ellis has cast a woman in the leading role of the Duke. "Someone must take some risks," said Ellis. "I think that theatre is always most successful when it is allowed to challenge and defy the values, expectations, and moral assumptions of its audience."

General admission for all performances is \$4.50; for GVSC students, high school students, and senior citizens, it is \$2.50. Reservations may be made through the theatre office at ext. 3485.
