#### GVSC United Way Campaign Planned

The week of October 29 through November 2 has been set for the annual Grand Valley State College United Way campaign. This year's goal is \$17,000, approximately a 10% increase over 1983-84, according to Arthur Hills, campaign chairman. The average contribution last year by those faculty and staff who gave was \$53.32, with a grand total of \$15,500.

United Way provides support for 62 human service agencies and 180 special programs. More than 90¢ of each dollar contributed goes directly to the programs supported.

#### 2.7 Percent Unemployment Rate Found Among College Graduates

"College graduates continue to have substantial advantages over other workers in the labor market, the U.S. Department of Labor has reported. The unemployment rate for college graduates of ages 25 to 64 was 2.7 per cent, according to a survey. The rate for those with one to three years of college was 5.3 percent, and for high school graduates, 7.2 percent. Of those who were working, two thirds of the male college graduates and 71 per cent of the female graduates held managerial or professional jobs. For workers with one to three years of college, the comparable figures were 25 percent for men and 28 percent for women. About 12 percent of high school graduates had professional or managerial jobs."
