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# FRE 316: Advanced French Grammar OER Curation

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# Overview

## **Scope Notes**

Instructor is trying out a new text, *En Bonne Forme*, during the upcoming winter semester. The previously used text was changed, because the text was in English and that made for extra work for students to learn additional vocabulary and for the instructor who makes all their presentation materials in French. The instructor would like open educational materials that use examples from authentic texts and literature as having "a real life context for the grammatical structures, so [students] can see the value of understanding how they work" and provide students with how the French grammar they're learning can be useful creatively in writing and for their own personal expression. Additionally, the instructor would like self correcting activities that provide students with instant feedback while practicing with authentic French materials. The instructor would like to begin utilizing some OER materials during the upcoming semester and redesign the course in summer.

### Search Notes

The search consulted OER Commons, Merlot, BC Open Textbooks, Pressbooks, OpenOregon, and the Open Textbook Library. There is an abundance of French textbooks and online game resources that could be a great fit for the course. The main hurdle during the search is with the curator only having a minor understanding of French and the levels of studying a foreign language could mean not all resources will be appropriate for this specific course.

## Gap Analysis

Gaps are difficult to determine when working with a foreign language. In general there appears to be a variety of French language materials that focus on grammar and more advanced students. There is a need for greater practice and interactive activities for students. Instructors have the language expertise to better determine what gaps need to be addressed.

In addition to the online book, or physical book for purchase, there is an associated website to provide students with listening and speaking exercises with the goal that students will gain confidence as French speakers. These materials could be used in the classroom or adapted as supplemental practice material for students. Additionally, the authors are working on an instructor manual to accompany this resource.

sections of the resource link to games to address the same grammar points and filters can be used to select games that focus on the same grammar points, both of which can be used by students to gain more practice in areas they most need it. Additionally, the games are mobile friendly. This resource could be a great fit for homework practice or in-class games.

  developed and in use at the University of Texas since 2004, and is Tex's French grammar
  is the companion site. In addition to the text, there are 320 videos, recorded vocabulary
  lists, phonetic lessons, grammar lessons, and self-correcting exercises. However, some

have described the resource as for beginning French and may not be the appropriate level of French for this course, so it is considered a potential stretch resource.
