GVSC's Board of Control has unanimously approved a resolution expressing strong opposition to Proposal C. At its meeting on October 25, the Board said that the proposed constitutional amendment would have "long-range adverse effects on Grand Valley State College and on the concept of representative government as we have known it throughout our national history."

Passage of Proposal C would cut back state aid to GVSC by \$1.34 million and would necessitate a 15.5% tuition hike to compensate for that cutback. In commenting earlier on the effects of Proposal C, GVSC President Arend D. Lubbers said, "Michigan's entire educational system, public and private, from kindergarten through graduate schools, would be heavily damaged, and the door would be shut to higher education for many young people and adults in the state if this proposal passes."

The GVSC Board also approved a proposal that \$3,600 in unrestricted college funds be donated to the Promote Michigan Committee, a group fighting Proposal C.

In other business at the board meeting, President Lubbers reported

that gifts and grants to the college for the 1983-84 fiscal year totaled a record \$3,340,000. The college receives gifts from corporations and businesses, alumni, individuals and families, foundations, and other voluntary sources. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1984, those gifts totaled \$2,500,000 in cash and \$840,000 worth of in-kind gifts including such items as property, equipment, and merchandise for the annual WGVC/Channel 35 auction. The gifts included over \$400,000 that was raised for GVSC's four-year engineering science degree program and a corporate equipment donation for a complete engineering laboratory.

#### Geology Department Receives Mineral Collection

The Geology Department has received an extensive mineral collection from Mr. and Mrs. Paul Miller of Big Star Lake, Michigan. The larger pieces in the collection are now on display in the lobby of Zumberge Library, and the remainder on the first floor of Loutit Hall.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller attended a special GVSC reception held in their honor on Friday, October 26, in the college's administrative offices. The collection, which has taken the Millers over 25 years to assemble, contains a wide variety of minerals, calcite crystals, copper, azurite, jade, opal, and many others. varieties. According to geology Professor William Neal, some of the pieces are of gem quality.

Paul Miller, who is now retired, owned a road construction company for many years and worked on highways throughout the state. Most of the pieces in the collection are from Michigan, many collected in abandoned mine dumps during the summers of road construction work in the Upper Peninsula. Some pieces come from much farther away (there are specimens from Israel included), collected during the Millers' extensive foreign trips.

The Millers will soon be moving to Key West, Florida, where they have spent winters for many years. Since moving their entire mineral collection would be unwieldy, they decided to donate it to Grand Valley, where it could be displayed in its entirety.

According to geology Professor Dick Lefebvre, the display in Zumberge Library will be moved to Loutit Hall in December, and the entire collection will be displayed there permanently for the benefit of the entire community.

#### Host Families Needed

Antionette (Toni) Turner, director of special services, reports that host families are needed for three GVSC international students. Host families have no legal or financial obligation to the student, but serve mainly as a support system. The host family assists the student in adjusting to a foreign environment and may be required to house the student during times when classes are not in session. Other arrangements for time spent together are made by the family and the student.

Needy students this semester include a male South African graduate student studying in the School of Education, a male undergraduate hospitality/tourism management major from Taiwan, and a Chilean female undergraduate student.

#### Seidman School to Publish Business Quarterly

The Seidman School of Business, in conjunction with the Upjohn Institute, will begin publication of a quarterly journal, entitled Business Outlook. The publication was introduced at a joint news conference last week with Marvin DeVries, Dean of the Seidman School of Business, and Robert Spiegelman, Director of the W.E. Upjohn Institute in Kalamazoo.

The journal will provide a picture of the economic, business, and employment outlook for the Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, and Muskegon metropolitan areas.

Ten thousand copies of the first edition of the magazine, which covers the Fall 1984 quarter, were released on November 1 and mailed to regional businesses and industries, educational institutions, and governmental agencies.

The magazine features an exclusive index of west Michigan's economic indicators and includes projections on the economic outlook for the next several months. Each issue will also contain information on real estate activities and employment levels as well as an index of consumer sentiment for the area.

#### Polish Professors Visit GVSC

Two Polish faculty members from the Economic Academy of Poland are spending the remainder of the fall semester at Grand Valley as part of an exchange program between their college and GVSC. In May, 15 Grand Valley students will go to Poland and study Polish economy, history, and international relations in Cracow, Poland.

Zofia Dach, one of the Polish faculty members, studied at the College of Economics in Cracow, where she has been a member of the faculty since 1965. In 1973, she received her doctorate in economic sciences from that college.

Dach is interested in unemployment problems in Poland and other countries. For the past 16 years, she has also been studying the roles of professional women. While at GVSC, she is pursuing those studies with various Grand Valley faculty members.

Stanislaw Belniak, a member of the faculty of the Academy of Economics since 1971, has a Master of Economics and a Doctor of Economic Sciences degree from that college. His professional interests include economic analysis in the area of tourism and recreation. He has
