Safety and Security Officers Ratify Contract

Campus Safety and Security officers, represented by the Fraternal Order of Police, have reached a new contract agreement with the college. The three-year contract, which was unanimously ratified by the Board of Control's Audit, Business and Finance Committee, calls for a six percent wage increase for each of the three years; an increase in shift pay; and an increase in uniform cleaning allowance. The college agreed to continue the same fringe benefit package, including anticipated cost increases.

SRA Fixed-Period Payment Option

Effective January 1, 1985, the fixed period payment option for TIAA/CREF Supplemental Retirement Annuities (SRAs) will be expanded. Fixed period payments are now available for periods of from two to 10 years. Starting January 1, SRA fixed period payments will be available for periods of from two to 30 years. option to receive death benefits from both TIAA/CREF Retirement Annuities and SRAs for fixed periods of from two to 30 years continues to be available.

The recent Deficit Reduction Act set one limitation: a beneficiary who receives a death benefit cannot choose a fixed period payment that exceeds his or her life expectancy. For example, a 65-year-old beneficiary could not elect to receive payment of a death benefit over a 30-year period.

repair the exterior walls of Loutit Hall, replace one of the original chillers, and install a new low-pressure boiler.

GVSC Awards First Zimmerman Scholarship

Darryl Scott Weekly, a resident of Dorr, Michigan, is the first recipient of Grand Valley State's William Zimmerman Scholarship. Weekly is a member of the United States Marine Corps Reserve, as required in the provisions for the scholarship.

The Zimmerman scholarship was established as a memorial to Marine Corps Lieutenant William Zimmerman, a former GVSC student who was killed in the Beirut bombing in October, 1983.

Weekly, who has been attending GVSC since 1981, is a psychology major and an officer candidate in the U.S. Marine Corps. He was introduced to the Marines during his freshman year at Grand Valley State when he joined the Marine Corps' Platoon Leaders Class, a reserve program which evaluates civilians and assesses their abilities as potential marine officers. Weekly, a senior at GVSC, is receiving \$750 from the Zimmerman Scholarship fund for this academic year.

NEWS NOTES - NATIONAL AVERAGE SAT SCORES RISE

"College-bound high school seniors' national average scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) rose one point on the verbal section and three points on the mathematics section — the largest combined gain since the SAT score decline began in 1963, George H. Hanford, president of the College Board, announced recently.

"This year's seniors averaged 897 on both parts of the test, compared to 893 last year. The average combined score in 1963 was 980.

"Although the 1984 scores represent the largest gain in 20 years and the third consecutive year in which at least one score increased, Hanford said the public should not become complacent about quality education in the United States.

"'The time is ripe for a major commitment of resources to help the schools magnify and accelerate the improvement they are already beginning to show, so that higher quality education can be achieved for all students -- and sooner,' Hanford said."
