Americans Support Increased Federal Aid For Higher Education

A new survey of American attitudes toward higher education found that 63.3 percent of those polled think that federal aid to higher education should be increased. Survey results also indicate that increasing federal aid for higher education is the third highest national priority for Americans.

The survey, conducted by Group Attitudes Corporation of New York, found that four out of five Americans are convinced that college costs are climbing at such a rate that college will be out of the reach of the average person in the foreseeable future. About 75 percent of those polled indicated that they will be able to afford college costs only with the help of lowinterest loans or grants, and 61 percent said they felt that the federal government should increase financial assistance to needy college students.
