Hillegonds to speak as 50th anniversary lecturer

In celebration of Grand Valley's 50th anniversary, former Speaker of the Michigan House Paul Hillegonds will bring his first-hand experience in government and business to his talk about what the next 50 years holds for Michigan.

Hillegonds' lecture is scheduled for Wednesday, February 16, at 7 p.m. in the DeVos Center, Loosemore Auditorium. A reception will be held at 5:45 p.m. and the lecture will be followed by a question-and-answer session. The event is free and open to the public.

Named by *Governing Magazine* in 1994 as Public Official of the Year, Hillegonds is currently senior vice president of corporate

affairs at DTE Energy. Former president of Detroit Renaissance, Hillegonds serves on many boards including the Cultural Alliance for Southeast Michigan, Detroit Regional Chamber Foundation, Michigan Economic Development Corporation, Michigan Future, Inc., Michigan Roundtable for Diversity and Inclusion, Center for Michigan, and Kresge Foundation.

Hillegonds is the second of three speakers in Grand Valley's Distinguished Academic Lecture series speculating on what the next 50 years may hold. Hillegonds will discuss "The Next 50 Years in Michigan." Previously in September, author, academician and businesswoman Jill Ker Conway presented, "The Next 50 Years in the World." The series will conclude with

documentary filmmaker Ken Burns' presentation "The Next 50 Years in the United States" on April 21.

Kutsche office awards grant

The Kutsche Office of Local History has awarded a mini-grant to a community and faculty research team whose project focuses on Merze Tate, an area African American woman who served in the U.S. State Department.

Director Veta Tucker said the grant is consistent with the mission of the office that was founded by Paul Kutsche, a native of Grand Rapids and retired anthropology professor from Colorado College. Kutsche established the office at Grand Valley in 2008 with the intent to giving voice to local underrepresented groups.

Sherry Johnson, assistant professor of English, received a grant to collaborate with researcher Sonya Bernard Hollins and create an exhibit on the life of Tate, a Mecosta County woman who was the first African American woman to earn a doctorate from Oxford University. Tate later held a state department position. Tucker, professor of English and African/African American Studies, said the Tate exhibit will be on display at the Michigan Women's Hall of Fame in Lansing. Students in one of Tucker's classes created a passport to guide visitors through the exhibit, and art and design students will mount digital photos.

Last fall, the Kutsche Office helped fund a book project, *A New Home in Michigan*, which tells the story of Mexican Americans who migrated to Muskegon prior to World War II. "That project started with oral histories and we provided seed money for them to publish a book," Tucker said. "If a community group has a project that fits with our mission, we can help them bring it to reality."

This spring the office will host its second forum for local historians from public museums, historical and genealogical societies, local libraries and other organizations.

Tucker said "Museum 101" sessions will be held in March, April and May to help volunteers understand the basics of artifact preservation and archive collection. The workshops will be open to Grand Valley students who are interested in museum careers; visit the website www.gvsu.edu/kutsche for details.

Tucker is also helping coordinate a Juneteenth celebration in Grand Rapids to coincide with the sesquicentennial of the start of the Civil War.

"It's important to me as the country commemorates the sesquicentennial to look at the presence of African Americans and Native Americans and their role in the Civil War," Tucker said. Early plans for the Grand Rapids celebration include period costumes, re-enactors, food, arts and crafts, music and poetry.

Committee proposes changes to General Education program

The General Education Committee has proposed two broad changes to the current GE program that better align it with the national conversation on liberal education and address concerns about the upper-level component.

The proposed changes are to add three new general education goals (teamwork, problem-solving and civic responsibility) and reduce the number of goals per each GE course; and eliminate the 22 theme categories, create a new upper-level “Global Issues” requirement, and reduce the requirement from three courses to two.

Carol “Griff” Griffin, director of General Education, said she and the committee think that the proposal more closely aligns with the university mission.

Four campus-wide forums will be held to discuss the proposed changes:

Griffin said unit- and college-level discussions are also scheduled.

The final proposal is scheduled to be presented to University Academic Senate in April.

Climate study survey reaches midpoint

More than 1,260 campus community members completed the myGVSU Survey within the first three days of its launch.

WISE receives grant from AAUW

One of Grand Valley’s academic living and learning communities received a grant from the American Association of University Women to boost its mentoring program and enhance relationship building.

The Women in Sciences and Engineering Program earned a \$4,300 grant from AAUW’s Campus Action Project. Laurie Witucki, faculty director of the WISE program, said the grant will be used to help facilitate roundtable discussions among WISE students and faculty members, and to participate in Grand Valley’s Community Reading Project.

“Students also will give back to the community by participating in science events with middle and high school students,” said Witucki, associate professor of chemistry.

The Women’s Center partnered with WISE to apply for the grant. Ashley

Kim Walton Program Coordinator, MAREC

Kim Walton dedicates her life to working with natural resources, environmental issues and renewable energy technology. She joined the Grand Valley Michigan Alternative and Renewable Energy Center in June as its first program coordinator.

Walton’s position fuses her background in business and environmental education, adding new dimensions to MAREC. She began and co-operates her own renewable energy company. She has worked extensively in North Carolina and Michigan with farmers to organize environmental workshops on the local, state and regional levels. She has also helped private schools develop curriculum that incorporates renewable energy topics.

Walton grew up in Barry County, and said she is a country girl at heart. She received a bachelor’s degree from Appalachian State University and a master’s degree from Western Michigan University in environmental analysis. “Working with environmental issues is my niche,” said Walton. “I had an interest in natural resources that began before there was an Earth Day!”

Since her arrival, Walton has provided sustainability and energy education for Grand Valley and the surrounding community. She is coordinating the first MAREC Lunch and Learn series and is planning a Renewable Energy Science Fair for spring, geared toward local

high school and community college students. She said sharing the right information about renewable energy and environmental issues excites her.

“I enjoy helping people sort out facts from myths and misconceptions,” said Walton. “Each house and building site is different, and the effectiveness of renewable energy technology is very site specific.”

“Too many times, people are misinformed about the capacity, proper placement, and operation of a renewable energy system. This misinformation may result in a system working poorly or the system may work well, but the owners have unrealistic expectations and are disappointed.”

Walton also serves on the Midwest Solar Training Advisory Committee. She enjoys tending to her 30-acre farm and animals, including foundation-bred appaloosa and Suffolk Punch draft horses.

Ensler's provocative yet wildly entertaining and acclaimed play has been performed at GVSU for the past nine years. It has reached more than 9,000 audience members with its message of ending violence and has raised more than \$90,000 for local, national and international anti-violence initiatives.

This year, Grand Valley hopes to raise \$10,000 in proceeds from the productions. Proceeds from this year's event will benefit local organizations and the VDay designated initiative Women of Haiti, which focuses on women and girls of Haiti who have been victims of violence.
