Albright receives Hauenstein Fellowship Medal

Former Secretary of State Madeleine Albright was presented with the Ralph W. Hauenstein Fellowship Medal, one of Grand Valley's highest honors.

She is the third recipient of the medal. Others were awarded posthumously to President Gerald R. Ford and to former U.S. National Security Advisor Brent Scowcroft, who served under presidents Ford and George H.W. Bush.

Gleaves Whitney, director of the Hauenstein Center, said Albright broke the glass ceiling her generation faced. "All people who aspire to public service can look to Dr. Albright's storied career for inspiration," he said.

At the January 29 medal presentation, Albright shared stories about her upbringing, what impacted her life choices and goals, her education in the U.S. and abroad as a child.

Albright recounted several stories about her famous lapel pins, including times when pins got her in trouble, and when they eased tensions during diplomatic trips. One of her more well-known pins is the head of the Statue of Liberty, with two small clocks as the eyes. One of the clocks is upside-down; she said, "so that I had one clock to know when a meeting was done, and so did the other person in the room."

Her collection of pins are on exhibit at the Gerald R. Ford Presidential Museum in Grand Rapids through April 12.

"It's our honor to name this award after Coach Baltes," said Sam Seemes, association CEO. "His teams at GVSU have shown great excellence in recent years and his name will forever be etched with this award. His team made history as the first to earn a Division II triple crown and that should be celebrated for generations to come."

Baltes led the Lakers to a historic 2010-2011 season, when the women's teams won the triple crown of national titles in cross country, and indoor and outdoor track and field.

Conference to focus on healthy aging

Longevity — living a long life — is on the rise. Yet only one in 4,400 people lives to be 100 or more.

National and local experts will talk about the positive potentials of later life and holistic approaches to healthy aging, during Grand Valley's eighth annual Art and Science of Aging Multidisciplinary Conference.

Workshop sessions during "The Age of Empowerment" will cover topics such as healthy eating, exercise, laughter, advance directives, dementia care and more.

The conference is set for Friday, February 8, from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. in the DeVos Center, Loosemore Auditorium.

Keynote speaker Thomas H. Perls will give the opening presentation, "Living to 100: The Older You Get, The Healthier You've Been," at 9 a.m. Perls is a medical doctor and director of the New England Centenarian Study at Boston University.

As part of the conference, Grand Valley students will present their research on aging, in a poster format, which will allow attendees to engage the students in discussions of their research.

The conference is underwritten in part by support from the Provost's Office and a grant from Michigan State University's federally funded Geriatric Education Center of Michigan.
