## Grand Valley students, staff 'Dashing' to success

Grand Valley students have decided in huge numbers that saving money, the environment and their sanity is good reason to ride the bus.

The DASH to the Hill shuttle saw an increase of 333 percent from September 2002 to September 2003. Ridership totals went from 6,901 in September 2002 to 29,909 for the same month in 2003, an amazing increase of 23,008 passengers.

"We've created a culture of transit," explained Lisa Haynes, director of operations for Pew Campus and regional centers. "We have increased the frequency of routes and extended hours and weekend service, but it takes more than just increased service. You have to create a culture that embraces public transportation."

To coincide with the opening of the Cook-DeVos Center for Health Sciences in August, Grand Valley began operating the DASH to the Hill/CHS shuttle in partnership with the Grand Rapids Parking Services and the Rapid. The route modified the former DASH to the Hill route to stop at CHS.

Grand Valley is committed to solving all parking challenges, including the one in the Michigan Hill area. The ridership numbers illustrate the success of the program, but Haynes said the program itself illustrates the

spirit of cooperation that made it possible.

"The willingness to have three separate entities — the city, the Rapid and Grand Valley — all come together as a team is what made the improved service and ridership possible," Haynes said.

The three entities also got a great deal of help from students. "Believe it or not, 'bus buddies' have become a norm for many Grand Valley students," explained Rachael Voorhees, president of Grand Valley's Student Senate.

Voorhees cited saving time, money and frustration, as well as protecting the environment as reasons for riding the shuttle and the Campus Connector, the bus that runs between the Allendale and Pew Grand Rapids campuses.



"We love it," Voorhees said. "It's normal to be packed into Campus Connector buses, with conversations flying, and forget the 25-minute ride between the campuses. The Student

# Voice student honored in national arts recognition

Freshman Jason Coffey was one of 10 voice students chosen nationally — and the only voice student selected from Michigan — to participate in the recent Arts Recognition and Talent Search (ARTS) Week, held January 5-11 in Miami, Fla.

As part of the event, the Allendale native received one-on-one voice instruction from international opera star Placido Domingo, who is recognized around the world both as an individual artist and as part of the Three Tenors.

ARTS is sponsored by the National Foundation for the Advancement of the Arts (NFAA), which honored Domingo at a black tie gala on January 10. Earlier that morning, Domingo

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

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conducted a master voice class in which Coffey received individual instruction from the master himself. The awards ceremony and master class will be aired by WGVU at a future date.

More than 6,500 17- and 18-year-olds from all over the nation applied for the ARTS honor in nine categories. Of those, 125 were selected as finalists, including the 10 voice students. Though young, all 10 vocal students have already distinguished themselves with many awards honors, and scholarships.

Coffey's vocal honors include 2003 NATS Great Lakes Regional Auditions winner (freshmen men); Most Promising Undergraduate for Great Lakes Region; Verdi Opera Theater of Michigan Ninth Annual Italian Songs and Arias First Place Winner; 2002 and 2003 Bach Festival top honors, and more. He is studying vocal performance under Associate Professor Dale Schriemer.


News and Information Services is producing a photography book, DVD and VHS to commemorate the 2003 championship football season.
