### Overnight Parking Restrictions

Following is a reminder from the Department of Safety and Security of the overnight parking regulations on campus. Please refer to Section 2.12, Overnight Parking Restrictions, of the campus Traffic and Parking Ordinance for specific details, particularly item "a": "No overnight parking in Lots C, F, G, H, and J, except with permission of the Director of Safety and Security. D, and E (Resident Lots) shall require a 'Reserved' sticker or a temporary permit issued by the Safety and Security Office." During snow removal periods, any vehicle found to be in violation of the ordinance will be subject to impound. Any questions should be referred to the Department of Safety and Security, ext. 3255.

### **Emergency Closing Policy**

Grand Valley State College's emergency closing policy for this year is similar to that for previous years, with WOOD radio (1300-AM and 105.7-FM) in Grand Rapids to be notified first.

Students, faculty and staff are asked not to call the Grand Valley switchboard to ask about closings. Everyone should assume we are open unless they hear otherwise on the media.

The college will close all or part of its operations only in the case of extreme emergency caused by impassable roads, violent weather, energy loss, or other conditions seriously endangering the health and safety of students, faculty, and staff.

Every effort will be made to make the decision to close as early in the day as possible but no later than 7 a.m. for daytime classes and 3 p.m. for evening classes.

In such cases, faculty members are responsible for notifying students for each class they teach. They should refrain from calling secretaries, the Physical Plant, Public Relations, or other campus offices to notify their students. The media will announce only complete closings, not cancellation of individual classes or events.

# COT Training and Development Update

The COT Training and Development Committee is beginning to plan a 1985-86 schedule of activities. Comments from supervisors in response to the committee's survey concerning training and development needs were encouraging. The committee is considering those comments in making their plans. In general, supervisors indicated they were in favor of training and development op-portunities for support staff, although budget limitations were cited as a problem. According to supervisors, training should be directed toward strengthening general skills, exposure to new technology and new knowledge, and personal growth. The committee is interested in hearing opinions on possible activities for next year. The committee is also in the process of planning a spring event for all clerical, office, and technical staff. More information will be published as it becomes available.

### Field House Notes

According to Mike Stodola, manager of the Field House, faculty and staff who use the facilities should note the following:

- Racquetball court reservations can now be made up to seven days in advance. You are more likely to get a court close to your desired hour if you schedule early. Call the Equipment Issue Room, 895-3100, for each reservation.
- The public recreation schedule lists the hours each activity area is open for normal use. Check the special events calendar to see what's happening on a specific day. The word "exclusive" means that area is open only for the listed activity, and that public recreation is not available at that time.

 Walleyball equipment is available for checkout in the Equipment Issue Room, 895-3100.

The sign-line information board at the main entrance lists the events and activities at the Field House.

- A jogger's clock is available in the main arena for timing laps. Each lap on the indoor track is 1/8 of a mile.
- A timing clock for lap swimmers is available for use in the swimming pool.

# World Needs More 'Universal' Men and Women

"Former Secretary of State
Dean Rusk says more 'universal
men and women' are needed to
solve the world's problems,
but he added that he is not
sure American colleges and
universities are doing enough
to develop such individuals.

"Instead, the last half century has seen development of just the opposite: more disciplines, more specialization, said Rusk, now a professor of international law at the University of Georgia, Athens. Rusk was among the speakers at the 'National Conference on the Future of

University Research' held at the Georgia campus.

"Rusk encouraged campuses to help create in people an appetite and curiosity for lifelong learning.

"A former president of the Rockefeller Foundation, Rusk said universities need to build a pool of funds to support research, and he suggested that perhaps 100 percent of all funds raised be set aside for this purpose. Federal funding is crucial to the support of university research, he added, but there are pressures on the federal budget to decrease funding, and research tends to be some-

thing that's easily cut or postponed.

"Institutions must 'take themselves to the people,' Rusk said, adding that faculty members should be ready to share their research with the public so the public will understand the need for support.

"Rusk said he generally is optimistic about resources for university research but added that these resources are not something that can be taken for granted."
