Scope Notes

The course provides students with a foundation for integration of evidence-based concepts into the provision of nursing care. Class time and resources cover the process of developing research evidence leading to acquisition of skills, knowledge, and research that contribute to evidence based practice.

Students learn how to 1) identify appropriate sources of evidence to direct nursing care, 2) describe the different types of research and the advantages and disadvantages of each, 3) evaluate studies that underpin evidence-based guidelines for nursing practice, 4) identify the sources of literature that synthesize evidence, and 5) evaluate the strengths and weakness of different forms of evidence.

There are a large number of nursing resources, but a more limited amount for the specific topic of nursing research and evidenced based practice. Many resources listed below are suitable, but some are only partially useful as a supplemental resource for the course.



Gap Analysis

There appears to be a need for additional OER around nursing specific research and evidence-based practice. With this search it would be possible for an instructor to begin transitioning to OER, but they may not be satisfied to fully convert with OER adoption. Some of the resources found are best used as supplemental material for the course and it is likely that there will be need to adapt or create additional OER for such courses.

- Comments: This OER is designed for college students in the health sciences, especially nursing, to find and sue reliable information for assignments. The modules cover developing a research topic, searching databases, evaluating resources, and writing academic papers. The OER is most likely useful as a supplemental resource that complements a well-rounded text for the course.

- Comments: This open textbook was created for graduate-level nursing and education programs, and focuses on the role literature reviews play in the research process. The text will prepare students to conduct and write literature reviews. Students will learn how to form a research question, search existing literature, synthesize results and write the review. The book contains examples, checklists, supplementary materials, and additional resources. The OER is written by two librarians with expertise guiding students through research and writing assignments, and is openly licensed to permit full re-use and re-mixing. Due to the graduate student focus in crafting the resource, it may need to be revised to better suit an undergraduate reader.

- Transitions to Professional Nursing Practice was designed to provide a pivotal learning experience for students transitioning from an associate to baccalaureate degree. Topics covered in this text include professional nursing practice, baccalaureate education, healthcare in the 21st century, autonomy and accountability, nursing philosophy, professional development, communication, interprofessional collaboration, critical thinking, introduction to evidence-based practice, and nursing leadership and theory. The OER in whole is likely not the right fit for this course, but chapter 3's focus on evidence based practice is a suitable supplemental open resource.

- Comments: This textbook was created to provide nursing students a resource for the most fundamental tools for success. The chapters and activities provide keys for success both inside and outside of the classroom, starting with time management and

moving through study and test taking strategies. The majority of the text probably will not be suitable for the focus of the course, but the sections centering research during their nursing education and evidence based practice in the future are a good candidate for a supplemental OER to use in the course.

The author believes that often instructors tend to separate thinking, researching, and writing into different categories, but that these elements are more intertwined. This text may not be the right fit for all courses, but for instructors seeking a more holistic and rigorous WRT 150 section this may be an ideal OER textbook.
