Governor Appoints New GVSC Board Members

Governor James J. Blanchard has named two new members to the Board of Control of Grand Valley State College: Robert C. Pew, chairman and chief executive officer of Steel-case, Inc.; and Roman Ulman, administrative coordinator for the Commission of Public Lighting, City of Detroit. Both men were appointed to serve eight-year eight-year terms.

Pew was involved with the founding of GVSC as a member of the Citizens Council, which was instrumental in establishing the college in 1960. He recently served as a member of the Governor's Commission on the Future of Higher Education.

Pew has been with Steelcase, Inc., for 33 years. A native of Syracuse, New York, he is a graduate of Wesleyan University in Connecticut. He served as a pilot for the U.S. Air Force during the Second World War and the Korean crisis. He is active in many cultural, economic, and social agencies in the community.

Pew replaces board member Robert C. Hooker, who was appointed by former Governor William G. Milliken in 1982 to complete a portion of the term remaining when Tom Downs of East Lansing resigned. Hooker is president of Transnational Motors, Inc., Grand Rapids.

Roman Ulman was born in Poland and has lived in the Detroit area since 1948. Before accepting his current position with the city, he was a principal clerk with the 36th District Court of Detroit for ten years. He has served as deputy director of the city's City Civic Center Department and also worked for General Motors for a short time.

A 1977 graduate of Wayne State University, Ulman holds a B.A. degree in political science. He is active in the alumni association of that institution.

Ulman, 42, a Democrat, serves as a state party officer on the Democratic State Central Committee and is active in the 14th state congressional district. He also serves as president of the Polish Central Citizens Committee.

Ulman replaces Earl Holton, who resigned from the Board of Control in 1983. Holton is president of Meijer, Inc.

GVSC Ranks High In Tri-County "Draw"


Grand Valley's Office of Institutional Analysis has completed a survey of Michigan's 15 public colleges and universities which provides data on numbers of Michigan resident students from each county attending each of the institutions. Grand Valley conducted the survey to ascertain the effectiveness of its own recruitment efforts but also as a service to the other higher education institutions in the state. Such information was not previously available.

As the following graphs indicate, GVSC ranks highest in drawing power for students residing in Kent, Muskegon, and Ottawa counties.


Last fall there was an increase of 1.7 percent over the previous year in the number of tri-county area students attending GVSC.

Grand Valley ranked ninth out of the fifteen state colleges and universities in statewide "drawing power."

Lenten Service Scheduled

A special Catholic Lenten Service will be held on Ash Wednesday, February 20, at 5:15 p.m. in Room 123, Manitou Hall. Dr. Linus Pauling, a twotime Nobel Prize winner, will speak on campus on March 28 and 29. Pauling's appearance is sponsored by the Science and Mathematics Division as part of the college's Silver Anniversary celebration this.

Pauling received the Nobel Prize in chemistry in 1954 and in Nobel Peace Prize in 1962. He also holds many other awards and honors.

Pauling was born in 1901 and has spent his life in education and research at the California Institute of Technology, the University of California at San Diego, Stanford University, Oxford Uni-

versity, the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions, and at Linus Pauling Institute of Science of Medicine. He has written many books and has published numerous articles in professional journals.

On March 25 and 26, civil rights leader Bayard Rustin will give the 14th annual William James Synoptic Lecture. Rustin has been involved with major civil rights efforts such as the "Freedom Ride," the "March on Washington," and Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Rustin, 73, continues to be active in the Civil Rights Movement as its

leading and most respected theologian. Rustin's visit is being co-sponsored by the Urban League, Temple Emanuel, Grand Rapids Junior College, and Fountain Street Church.

The 50-voice Afro-American Choral Ensemble will present a noon hour concert in Louis Armstrong Theatre on Thursday, March 14. Under the direction of James E. Mumford of Indiana University, the ensemble presents a showcase of black music accompanied by narration.

The Forum will publish further details of 25th anniversary plans as they materialize.
