## Student Scholars Day ready to celebrate 20th year

A record number of presenters and faculty mentors will highlight the 20th annual Student Scholars Day on Wednesday, April 8.

Susan Mendoza, director of the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship, said more than 350 presentations are scheduled.

"We are excited to support the achievements of these students representing 70 diverse majors across the university," Mendoza said.

Poster, oral and panel presentations will run from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. at Kirkhof Center, Henry Hall and Mary Idema Pew Library. Film and live performances are scheduled for 1 and 5 p.m. in the library's multipurpose room, and an art exhibition will be shown in the library's exhibition space all day with an artist reception at 5 p.m.

The keynote speaker will be Brian Fagan,

emeritus professor of anthropology at the University of California at Santa Barbara, and an expert on the relationship between climate change and human society. Fagan will give a presentation at 7 p.m. in the Kirkhof Center, Pere Marquette Room.

Fagan wrote a bestseller, *The Great Warming: Climate Change and the Rise and Fall of Civilizations*, that showcases the power of climate change to disrupt and alter history.

### Menon named ACE Fellow

Shaily Menon, associate dean for professional development and administration in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, was named a 2015-2016 American Council on Education Fellow.

The ACE Fellows Program is designed to strengthen institutions and leadership in American higher education by identifying and preparing emerging leaders for senior positions in college and university administration.

During her time as one of 47 ACE Fellows, Menon will take part in various retreats, interactive learning opportunities and campus visits. She will also be placed at another institution to observe and work with the president and other senior officers, attend decision-making meetings and focus on issues of interest.

Menon will conduct a project intertwining design thinking and community engagement aimed at benefiting campus-wide initiatives at Grand Valley, such as internationalization, diversity, sustainability and big data analytics.

Menon said she hopes to leave her fellowship with a better understanding of the larger

landscape of higher education and the issues it faces.

"Universities are being called upon to address issues of access and equity, and to innovate in order to prepare students for a changing world and the ever-increasingly complex local and global problems they will face," Menon said. "I hope to learn about and gain insights into innovative strategies that can bring together various constituencies of higher education institutions and community stakeholders."

Provost Gayle R. Davis said she nominated Menon for the honor because she has distinguished herself in every role she has taken at the university.

### Niemeyer Award recipients announced

Three faculty members and four students will receive Niemeyer Awards at the Student Awards Convocation, set for Monday, April 6, at the Eberhard Center.

The awards are named for Glenn A. Niemeyer, the first provost of Grand Valley, and honor faculty and students who strive for excellence in all aspects of a well-rounded academic experience.

Faculty members are Craig Benjamin, associate professor of honors; Rebecca Davis, professor of nursing; and Linda McCrea, professor of education.

Benjamin is a founding leader of the burgeoning discipline of Big History, bringing the office of the International Big History Association to Grand Valley. Davis is an expert in the care of older adults and received a National Institute of Health grant to research wandering behavior among people with dementia. McCrea is the director of teacher education for the College of Education and was selected as a reviewer for two national accrediting bodies.

Undergraduate student recipients are Abigail DeHart, a Classics and philosophy double major, and Justin Ebert, an economics major.

Graduate student recipients are Julie Bulson, a doctor of nursing practice candidate, and Gabriel Kalmbacher, an MBA candidate.

## Historians earn awards, recognition from Kutsche Office

Three historians earned honors from the Kutsche Office of Local History during the annual Local History Roundtable March 26 at the Grand Rapids Public Library.

H. Sook Wilkinson, of Bloomfield Hills, received the second Gordon Olson Lifetime Contributions to Local History award. The award is named for Olson, former Grand Rapids city historian. Criteria for receiving the Olson award includes contributions to local history that give voice to

diverse communities. Finalists for the award were Cindy Laug and Lori Shusta.

A Korean adoptee herself, Wilkinson has written several books on the experiences of adoptees. Wilkinson has chaired the Governor's Advisory Council on Asian Pacific American Affairs as well as the new Michigan Pacific American Affairs Commission. She also serves on the Board of Trustees for Northern Michigan University.

Laug is the administrative assistant for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. She is well-known for her work in women's history.

Shusta has collected and preserved histories of Native Americans and the archives at the Grand Valley American Indian Lodge, where she works.

## Former governor talks education, tax reform

Former Michigan Gov. John Engler said states with the best education and talent will win economically, during his remarks at a Seidman College of Business event.

Engler, president of Business Roundtable, was the keynote speaker at the Peter F. Secchia Breakfast Lecture March 30, at the L. William Seidman Center.

Business Roundtable is an association of chief executive officers of leading U.S. corporations with a combined workforce of nearly 16 million workers and more than \$7 trillion in annual revenues.

Engler said investment in human capital is crucial and states need to "double down"

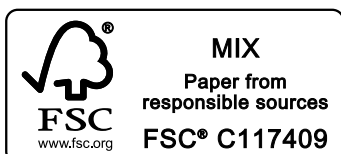

## Caravan event sheds light on kidnappings in Mexico

Family members of the 43 college students who were kidnapped last September in Iguala, Guerrero, Mexico, will visit campus on Tuesday, April 7.

The visit by two parents and one survivor of the incident is part of the U.S. speaking tour, "Caravana 43." It is about human rights violations and the events of September 26, 2014, when 43 students at Ayotzinapa Rural Teachers College disappeared after witnesses saw them clash with local police. The students are still missing.

"Ayotzinapa: What's Happening in Mexico" is set for 8-10 p.m. in the Mary Idema Pew Library, multipurpose room

Photos of the students' faces, carried on placards in demonstrations throughout Mexico and in other countries, have become symbols of the tens of thousands of forced disappearances and more than 100,000 killings in Mexico since 2006.

The event is in collaboration with the Coalition Justice for Ayotzinapa: Grand Rapids, and Grand Valley's Community Service Learning Center. It is sponsored by Grand Valley's Advocates for Immigration Reform, Hermanos, Latino Male Scholar Initiative, Latin American Studies and the Office of Multicultural Affairs.

on education.

"Nationally, only 36 percent of third-graders can read proficiently at the end of the school year — we can't make it with that kind of performance," he said. "Our goal should be 100 percent of students reading proficiently by the end of third grade."

He said millions of dollars are being spent on remediation for college students. He also said tax reform is needed to keep and attract young talent and new businesses.

A former three-term governor of Michigan, Engler said term limits don't allow for current state lawmakers to effectively learn about the budget and policies. "In the House of Representatives, lawmakers have two-to-four years of experience," he said. "That's taking a pretty big gamble with a \$50 billion budget."

## Faculty contribute to Rapid poetry

Passengers on The Rapid will have more than just West Michigan scenery to look at throughout April when poetry crafted by Grand

Valley faculty members will be on display during the Poetry on the Rapid program.

Beginning April 3, six poems will be featured on placards throughout The Rapid system. Designed by Vinicius Lima, assistant professor of graphic design y, the placards will feature works by multiple Writing Department faculty, including Patricia Clark, Chris Haven, Amorak Huey and Todd Kaneko. Faculty works from Calvin College and Grand Rapids Community College will also be on display.

The Poetry on the Rapid program celebrates the 50th anniversary of the National Endowment of the Arts and the National Endowment for the Humanities, as well as National Poetry Month.

## Family Health Center earns quality certification

The GVSU Family Health Center, the nurse-managed clinic operated by the Kirkhof College of Nursing, earned quality certification for two years from a national consortium.

The National Nursing Centers Consortium recognizes nurse-managed health clinics that meet quality standards and demonstrate a

commitment to measuring and improving quality of care and service.

Cynthia McCurren, dean of KCON, noted that with the implementation of the Affordable Care Act, ensuring the quality and efficiency of medical care services in the U.S. has become a major priority of reform.

She said this certification serves to strengthen the confidence in the quality of care, treatment, and services provided in communities served by nurse-managed health centers.

"I am incredibly proud of this team for their commitment to quality health care; and contributions to the education of nursing and a host of other interdisciplinary students," McCurren said.
