Additional Student Housing To Be Constructed

With the increase in student head count the past few years, there has also been an increase in the demand for student housing. This semester, each of the dormitories is filled at 98 to 100 percent capacity. Apartment complexes adjacent to campus reflect similar occupancy rates. Currently, 2,199 students, or 35 percent of the student body, reside in on-campus and near-campus housing.

To avoid overcrowding in the future, Lynn Francis, the owner of Grand Valley Apartments, located south of campus near the water tower, is planning to expand.

Francis intends to add two or three buildings to the existing three-building complex. Each new building will contain 12 two-bedroom units.

In a report presented to the Board of Control earlier this month, Vice President for Administration Ronald VanSteeland said Francis plans to begin construction in March or April.

GVSC Club to Feature Historical Perspectives

President Lubbers is urging all faculty and professional staff to participate in these events as well as in the commencement ceremonies which are scheduled for Saturday, May 11. James Zumberge, GVSC's first president will be the commencement speaker.
