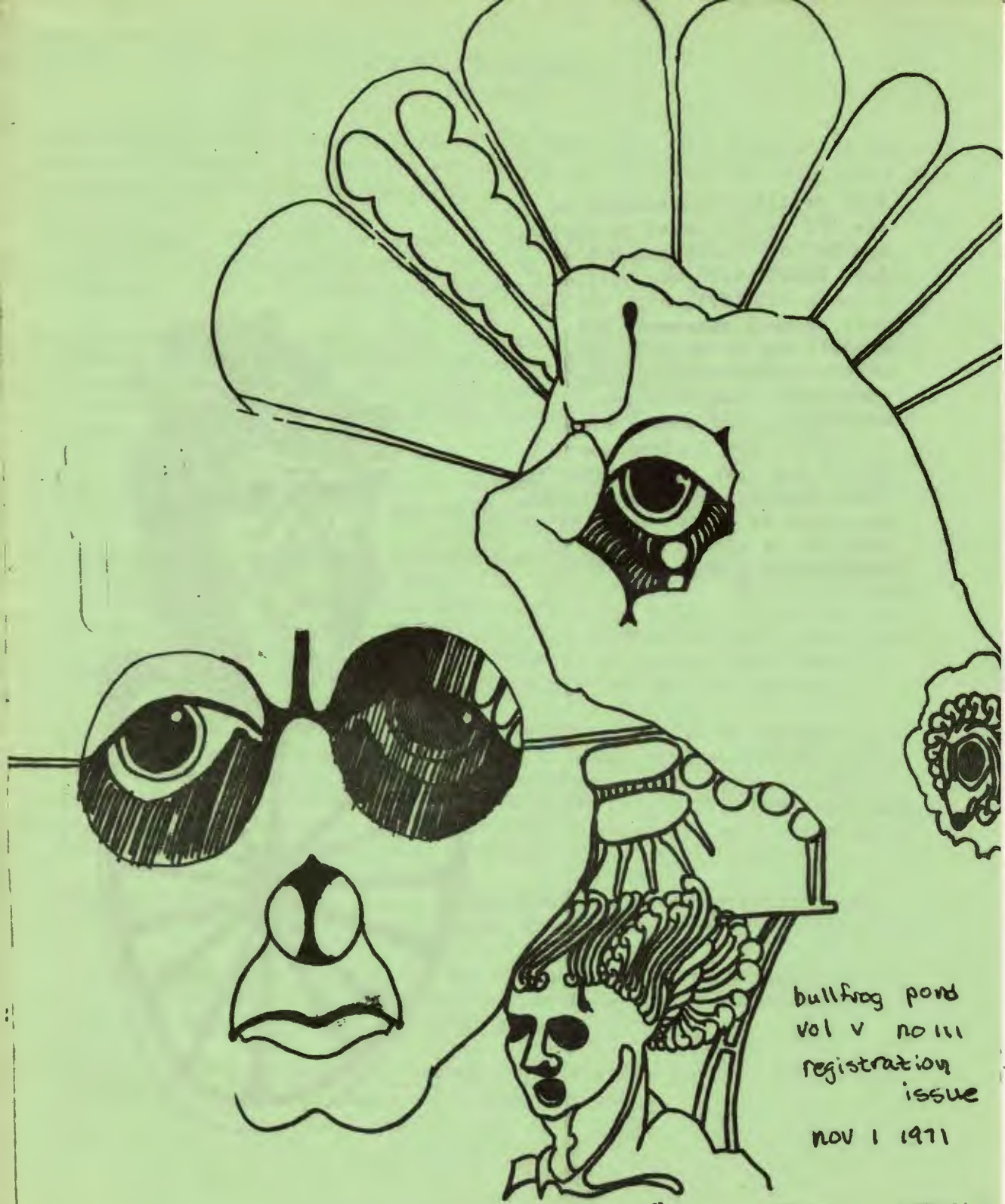

TJC STATISTICAL DATA
(Arm Yourself)

Many students, faculty and friends of TJC have expressed interest in various kinds of statistical information pertaining to TJC. The BFP will carry this information as it becomes available.

1. Attrition: GVSC had approximately 15% attrition last year (that is 15% of those students entering GVSC in the fall weren't around in the spring). TJC's attrition was only slightly lower at 14%.
2. Graduating Seniors: Last year GVSC graduated approximately 16% of its students. TJC graduated 10%. This lower percentage seems to be due to rapid growth. Even though the number of graduating seniors has increased steadily, the percentage remains pretty constant. This year about 13% will graduate.
3. Sex Ratios: In 1970-71 TJC had 60% males and 40% females. The balance is nearer 50/50 this year but we don't have exact figures yet.
4. Grade Point Average: The overall grade point average of CAS students in CAS courses is slightly above 2.0. Last year 143 TJC students took at least 1 CAS course. Their GPA's were 2.62, 2.82, 3.05 in the fall, winter, and spring terms. Fifty nine TJC students had CAS grade point averages of 3.5 or better. Many advanced CAS courses were taken by TJC students who had not had the prerequisites for the course.
5. Book Usage: (a) At last count, the average TJC student checked out 21 books per year from the library while a CAS student checked out 6 in the same period of time. (b) The average number of books used in a CAS course was 2.7 as compared to 4.0 for TJC. (This may mean that according to CAS standards a TJC student does more than 7 years worth of reading while a CAS student is doing 4).
6. Graduate Study: About 10% of CAS students go on for graduate work. Approximately 35% of TJC students do graduate work.
7. Is TJC Easy? Last fall in CAS 89% of the grades were passing. During the same period TJC gave 72% passing grades. The percentage of academic dismissals is also higher at TJC.
8. What can you do with a degree from TJC? The following is a list of TJC graduates and, if known, what they are doing.

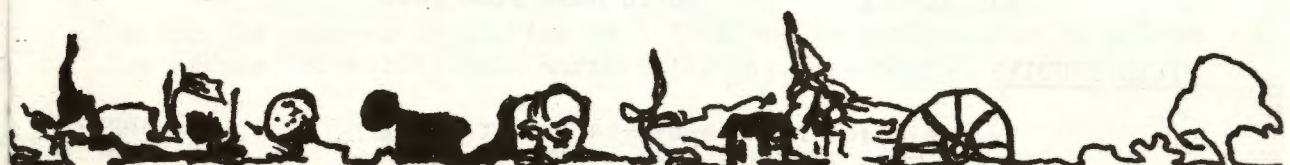

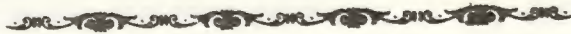

TJC Admissions Committee Meeting -- Minutes, October 8, 1971

PRESENT: Dan, Jerry D., Jerry T., John Mike

- 1.0 The chairmanship for the 71-72 school year was discussed. It was moved, supported, and passed that D. Andersen would continue as Chairman.
- 2.0 Discussion of number of applicants to admit. Attrition of returning students was extrapolated (generously!) from preceding years. "No shows" for winter term has been remarkably low in the past, and was felt that the same proportion could be used again. It was decided to admit 81 students for the winter term to reach a goal of 330 enrolled students.
- 3.0 Discussion of admissions procedures, new schools, decision-making.
- 4.0 Decisions:
Ten winter term applicants were acted upon, 9 admit, 1 N.A., three CAS transfers, one a WJC transfer. A total of 17 students have been admitted to the winter term.
- 5.0 Next meeting: to be arranged by the Chairman.



"OH, TO BE IN ENGLAND NOW THAT APRIL'S HERE." Somebody said that once. GVSC students now have a chance to go to England in the Spring, although not April. The GVSC Theatre Department is planning a British Isles Theatre Tour in March, tentatively from March 17th to March 29th. Students wishing to gain credit for this theatre tour have several options. The first is that they may take Theatre 399, a CAS course, which will meet on a regular basis in the spring term to utilize the theatre experience gained in the tour. Another is to do Contract Studies while on the tour, associated with theatre or other things, and register for them for credit in the Spring term. (They should be approved of before you go on the tour, however, to make sure that there are no hitches in the crediting.) Whichever you wish you should talk to Bill Iron in the GVSC Theatre Department. Initial deposits will be required and arrangements will have to be made before the end of the Fall term. For further information there is a notice on the bulletin boards in the common room and next to my office. And, of course, if you are at all interested, you should talk to Bill. He is willing to do some Contract Studies and others may be done with supervisors.

TJC Faculty Personnel Committee Minutes - Don Klein, Chairman

PRESENT: Dan Andersen, Mike Birtwistle, Jerry Diller, Ron Efron, T. Dan Gilmore, Hugh Haggard, Lee Kaufman, Christine Loizeaux, Merrill Rodin, Bob Shechtman, and Cam Wilson.

- 3.01 Moved and seconded that T. Dan Gilmore be authorized to draw up a plan to abolish rank and provide the full salary range for TJC appointments not tied to academic rank and present it to the Administration for their reactions. Passed.
- 3.02 Moved that we authorize T. Dan Gilmore to present various proposals as substitutes for tenure, spelled out in detail, to the Board of Control for their reactions only. Such proposals in no way obligate TJC to adopt a non-tenure plan. Carried.
- 3.03 Moved that we instruct our TJC Senators to substitute a motion considering the matter of college autonomy of tenure policies for any motions on the floor of the All-College Senate regarding specific policies of tenure. Carried.
- 3.04 Moved that until future determination is made regarding alternate tenure policies for TJC that TJC adopt a maximum 4-year probationary period for any faculty member regardless of teaching experience prior to teaching at Thomas Jefferson, and until a maximum 4-year probationary period rather than 3-year probationary period for faculty with 2 or more years prior teaching experience is approved by the Board of Control that TJC operate on a 3-4 tenure policy. The maximum tenure period for persons hired while the present Administrative Manual was/is in effect will remain 3-years, with 2-years prior teaching experience. The 4-year maximum probationary period for persons with prior teaching experience will apply only to future faculty members. Motion tabled due to insufficient notice.

3.05 Determination of positions above 6 for 1972-73 staffing

BS - Once we get the areas we need we should concentrate more on the person.

DK - How are we going to choose the next 6 people.

CW - Wish to present the following motion which has been circulated previously.

"Moved, that we hire as TJC Faculty for 72-73 at least six (6) women, the six best qualified female candidates we get even if there are instances in the six where a male candidate for the same position is judged "better."

CL - I think we should hire the best; there are women available that would and could be considered "best." Would like to see a woman hired who was very much into the subject of Womens Lib.

BS - We should try to increase the number of women; we should get some black people too.

RE - In some fields when we are considering a man and a woman and the man is really outstanding, it may be possible to hire both.

HH - moved that Cam's motion be amended to 4 instead of 6 women. Seconded. Not carried.

Cam's motion was seconded and the motion called. Motion not carried.

DK - Moved that 2 of the 11 or 12 positions we have for 72-73 be allocated quarter by quarter with visiting lecturers, performers, specific workshops, people with expertise in definite areas, etc. Seconded. Motion carried. Recommendations are to be submitted to Don Klein.

3.06 Consideration of candidate Stan Jackson (Music)

It was decided to poll the students further to see if they wanted another man in music.

In the meantime, Cam Wilson moved that we table the decision on hiring Stan Jackson until December 10, and a letter should be written to him stating this and that we have two other potential candidates to interview before we can decide. Motion Seconded and carried.

3.07 Suggestions for specific areas were: Womens Lib - Christine Loizeaux, (2 psychologists)- T. Dan Gilmore, and Religion - Bud Haggard.

3.08 Minutes (Personnel Committee, #1.00, 10/1/71)

Personnel Committee Minutes were approved with the following correction: The five priorities listed two psychologists - this should be changed to one psychologist and an Anthropologist.

A New Look For Registration

For several terms TJC has registered the day before classes begin. This last registration is probably the end of that practice. Since classes start on Tuesdays, apparently from now on and certainly for this year, our registration would be on Monday. A Monday registration means either scheduling during registration -- almost impossible with our increasing number of faculty and students -- or scheduling on Sunday -- no one likes that -- or during vacation (?).

Another problem is that accounting cannot process TJC, late registrants, and special students all on Monday, and the late and special ones must be done then.

A problem in another part of registration is the confusion and waiting that results from a first come-first served registration.

Still a fourth area of difficulty has arisen in the area of allowing non-TJC students to register for a limited amount of space in TJC offerings before our registration.

So--with that preamble, registration will look like this for the winter term and with minor variations for the spring term.

- 1) Seminar generation will be earlier in the term. Actually, of course, seminars for the next term can be posted on the bulletin board at any time after the current term starts, but the major time will be about the middle of the term. This fall they will be removed from the board for approval on November 1. If you wish to add any or sign up, it will have to be done before that date. Clearly, as is the case with most things in TJC, a few seminars will be added after that date.
- 2) As soon as the seminars are approved and scheduled, copies will be posted although the final schedules won't be printed and bound for a while. At this time students who were hoping for particular seminars that weren't approved may work out Contract Studies for those things. Of course, Contract Studies may be initiated any time during the current term for the succeeding one.
- 3) Examinations, standard offerings from TJC, and certain seminars that do not have non-TJC limits will be written up in a temporary time schedule for CAS & WJC registration. The total time schedule will be prepared for our own registration. For WJC and CAS students to register for

any other TJC offerings they will have to go through drops and adds. This will provide us with a better opportunity to serve TJC students in TJC offerings.

- 4) All currently enrolled TJC students (except those on Field Studies) and students transferring from CAS will register and pay tuition on December 9, the first day of exam week of the fall term.

Registration will take place in Rooms 102 and 103 Huron in this order:

K-Q	9:00
R-Z	10:00
A-F	11:00
G-L	12:00

(The alphabetical listing will be rotated each term. This time, to begin the sequence, an unbiased person drew K-Q. So that started it. Next term, R-Z will be first, then A-F, etc.)

Payment will be made in Accounting 154 Michigan before 4:00 p.m., December 9.

- 5) Any student who did not register and/or pay on December 9 must do so January 3. At this time late penalty fee policy will be in effect.

- 6) New students, re-entering students, and students who were on Field Studies in the preceding term will register on January 3, from 9:00 - 12:00 in 125 Lake Huron and pay in Accounting in 154 Lake Michigan before 4:00 p.m.

Students who expect to graduate during the term registered for, should fill out a diploma card, available during registration.

- 7) The student profile forms for TJC students must be turned in at registration.

- 8) Refunds will be made available upon official withdrawal at the Records Office as follows:

- Prior to January 4 ----- 80%
- Within the first five days of classes ---- 60%
- Within the second five days of classes --- 40%
- Within the third five days of classes ---- 20%
- After fifteen class days (Jan. 24, '72) -- No Refund

9. Drops and adds may take place during the first five days of classes. After that no adds may be made, but classes may still be dropped with the instructor's signature. All drops and adds by TJC students must be signed by Lee Kaufman, Academic Administrative Assistant.
10. There will be several changes in registration that you will notice. Profiles will be mailed to you and you won't have to fill them out at registration--just turn them in. You will get a different looking thing at the end instead of the customary cards to take to accounting.
11. One change that will take some thought is that the tutors will not keep the pink sheets from the schedule. Since they are not accurate representations of the student's final class selection, they serve little purpose. They will be collected at the end of registration--where they will be accurate--and retained during the term by Lee Kaufman for use in keeping track of drops and adds, especially Contract Studies, and to locate students during the term. At the end of the term, they will be returned to the tutors for the student's file.

TJC students may drop and add between registration, December 9, and the first day of classes, January 4, by getting drop-add slips from Lee Kaufman, having the appropriate faculty sign them and returning them to Lee Kaufman. They will be held then until the beginning of the official drop-add period and then taken up in a group. The time between registration and term beginning should provide an opportunity for students and faculty to see each other in terms of the new term and make necessary rearrangements.
