Board of Control Meeting Notes

The GVSU Board of Control members elected Paul A. Johnson chairman and Judith S. Hooker vice chairman at their first meeting of 1993, held on Friday, February 19, in the Eberhard Center.

The Board also elected Jean W. Enright as secretary, Ronald F. VanSteeland, treasurer, and James L. Willette, assistant treasurer.

James Schultz, dean of Academic Services and Continuing Education, reported to the Board that winter semester enrollment at GVSU set another record totaling 12,099, up two percent over last winter.

Other increases:

- Minority student enrollment rose to 8.5 percent of student body, from 7.8.
- Full-time students at 64 percent, up 4.5.
- Out-of-state students total 275, up 15.5 percent from last year.
- There is at least one student from every Michigan county represented in the student body. Students from Kent County total 3,716, Ottawa, 2,396, and Muskegon, 795.
- For calendar year 1992, 758 courses were offered at non-Allendale sites, up four percent over last year, 165 percent over 1985.
- Nearly 48,800 student credit hours were generated at non-Allendale sites, up seven percent over last year, and 190 percent over 1985.
- Out of the 15 state universities, GVSU ranks third (behind only Wayne State and Central Michigan University) in credit course activity and enrollments off the main campus.
- Some 455 college students in Michigan enrolled in courses via satellite through Michigan State University, University of Michigan, Western Michigan University, and GVSU during fall 1992 and winter 1993. Of that total, 67 percent were enrolled in either the

nursing or education satellite programs at Grand Valley.

D.J. Angus to Begin Eighth Season of Activities

Since the *D.J. Angus* program was launched seven years ago as part of the Water Resources Institute's Aquatic Sciences Education Outreach Program (ASEOP), it has carried over 19,000 persons on research and demonstration cruises.

The Angus, which carried 3,455 people last year, began its season in April with a trip to Ludington and ended in October in Hammond, Ind., a new port of call for the vessel. Demonstration cruises were provided for local schools in Hammond, as well as participants in the Lake Michigan Science Conference sponsored by the Hammond School District.

The floating classroom gave as many as three demonstration cruises a day and operated six days per week during the months of May and June. The participants, most of which are grades K-12 school groups, represent over 25 counties throughout Michigan and Northerm Indiana. The primary function of ASEOP is to provide information and educate the public about water pollution, wetlands, dune ecology, and water quality research. This is accomplished through demonstration cruises aboard the *DJ*. *Angus*, in which participants are given the opportunity to examine aquatic plant and animal life and measure environmental parameters such as dissolved oxygen, water temperature, pH, and turbidity.

Prior to the start of the season, the program suffered a setback with the untimely death of deckhand Joe Galbraith. However, returning Captains Richard Behm and Leonard Lamb, and deckhand Joe Rohloff, maintained ship operations with the assistance of two students assistants, Molly Helbing and Dennis Festerlins. Dr. Marilyn Park, assistant professor of biology, returned for a second season as on-board science instructor.

The calendar for the 1993 season, beginning in April, is nearly full and reservations are being confirmed.

New, Faster Modems For GVSU Dial-In

To serve the university community better, the Department of Information Technology has upgraded the in-bound modem pool from 2,400 to 14,400 baud on February 23. This will allow users with faster modems to access cc:Mail, library, and the IBM Mainframe with better performance.

The numbers of the modems, 895-2101 and 771-6794, will be the only numbers used for future use. The old numbers, 895-2300 and 771-6510, will be forwarded to 2101 and 6794 so that you don't have to change all your software right away.

You may set your communication software up to run at your modem's highest possible speed, up to 19,200 baud. The new modems will automatically match the speed of your current modem for connection.
