GVSU Women's Festival Set for March 18-21

Grand Valley's Women and Gender Studies Program will host its annual women's festival this year in conjunction with Legacy 2000, sponsored by the Grand Rapids Women's History Council.

"Festival 2000" will be held March 18-21, on the theme of "Gender, Memory and Representation." The various events will be held in downtown Grand Rapids and at the Kirkhof Center on GVSU's Allendale campus.

The Festival will begin on Saturday, March 18, with the annual film festival from 12 noon-9 p.m. at the Eberhard Center. The screenwriter of one of the featured films, the award-winning "Daughter Rite," will be the keynote speaker for this year's festival. Screenwriter, producer and educator, Michelle Citron, a former GVSU faculty member, will speak at 1 p.m. on Monday, March 20, in the Kirkhof Center. Citron has written and produced numerous films on women's issues.

In addition, the festival will include two full days of panel discussions and presentations on key women's issues on March 20-21. Topics include: literary sketches; media representations of gender and sexuality; science and gender; and gender, memory and genocide. There will also be a book exhibit and various information booths.

Festival 2000 will close with the presentations of the Maxine Swanson and Barbara Jordan awards in honor of women whose work deserves singular tribute. The Maxine Swanson Award, named for a former GVSU Board of Control member, is given to an individual who has provided leadership in the rights of women at Grand Valley. The Barbara Jordan Award is named for the late Barbara Jordan, a Texas legislator respected for her integrity and ability to inspire.

The reception will begin at 6:30 p.m., with the dinner at 7:15 p.m. at the Pantlind Ballroom of the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel.

Proceeds from the event will benefit scholarship programs for women in the Seidman School of Business. Individual tickets are priced at \$50 per person and corporate tables are available for \$1,000.

insider's view of
Washington, the political

process, and will discuss significant national issues. She has covered every major congressional news story since Watergate.

A graduate of Wellesley College, she received a 1985 Distinguished Alumnae Achievement Award from her alma mater. Wertheimer also holds honorary degrees from Colby College, in Waterville, Maine, and Wheaton College in Norton, Massachusetts. She also makes appearances on CBS-TV's Face the Nation program.

Legacy 2000 was created to raise awareness and to increase appreciation of women's contributions to history. This event complements a series of related activities that will be promoted throughout the area by Legacy 2000 and its members.



Marketing Professor's Book Explores Technology's Impact On Management

In the business world, those with the most technology win.

That's the general assertion in *Strategic*, *Organizational*, *and Managerial Impacts of Business Technologies*, a new book by



David Good, Grand Valley professor of Marketing, and Roberta Schultz, assistant professor of Marketing at Western Michigan University.

"Technology is a broad term that has evolved in meaning over the last few centuries," says Good. "No matter how one defines technology, however, it is clear that its usage has historically provided its owners and users a distinctive competitive advantage."

The book examines the roots and directions of technology, how technology will change organizational teamwork, its influence on internal and external relationships, opportunities provided for technological entrepreneurs, and the influence of technology on marketing, employees, customer partnerships, information systems, and resource strategies. Good and his coauthor introduce a host of business applications.

"This book provides managers a strategic road map to using technology as a competitive advantage, while remaining free from the entanglement of specific technologies," Good says.

Before receiving his Ph.D. in marketing from the University of Arkansas, Good worked in sales and sales management for A.T.&T., and in sales management, training, and strategic planning for Sprint. After leaving Sprint, Good became a principal and marketing manager for Business Systems Management. He has also written many articles addressing the strategic impacts of technologies and the management of competitive sales organizations.
