- The Institution

- Summon
 - Launched in late August
 - Single search box on homepage

After One Semester...

- The Question:
 - Was Anyone Using Summon?
- The Problem:
 - Summon doesn't currently have usage statistics
- The Solution(?):
 - Examine stats from other sources
- The Concern
 - Would this tell us anything? Could we actually determine if Summon was having an impact?

 - COUNTER Statistics
 - Searches
 - Full Text Downloads*
 - Google Analytics Statistics

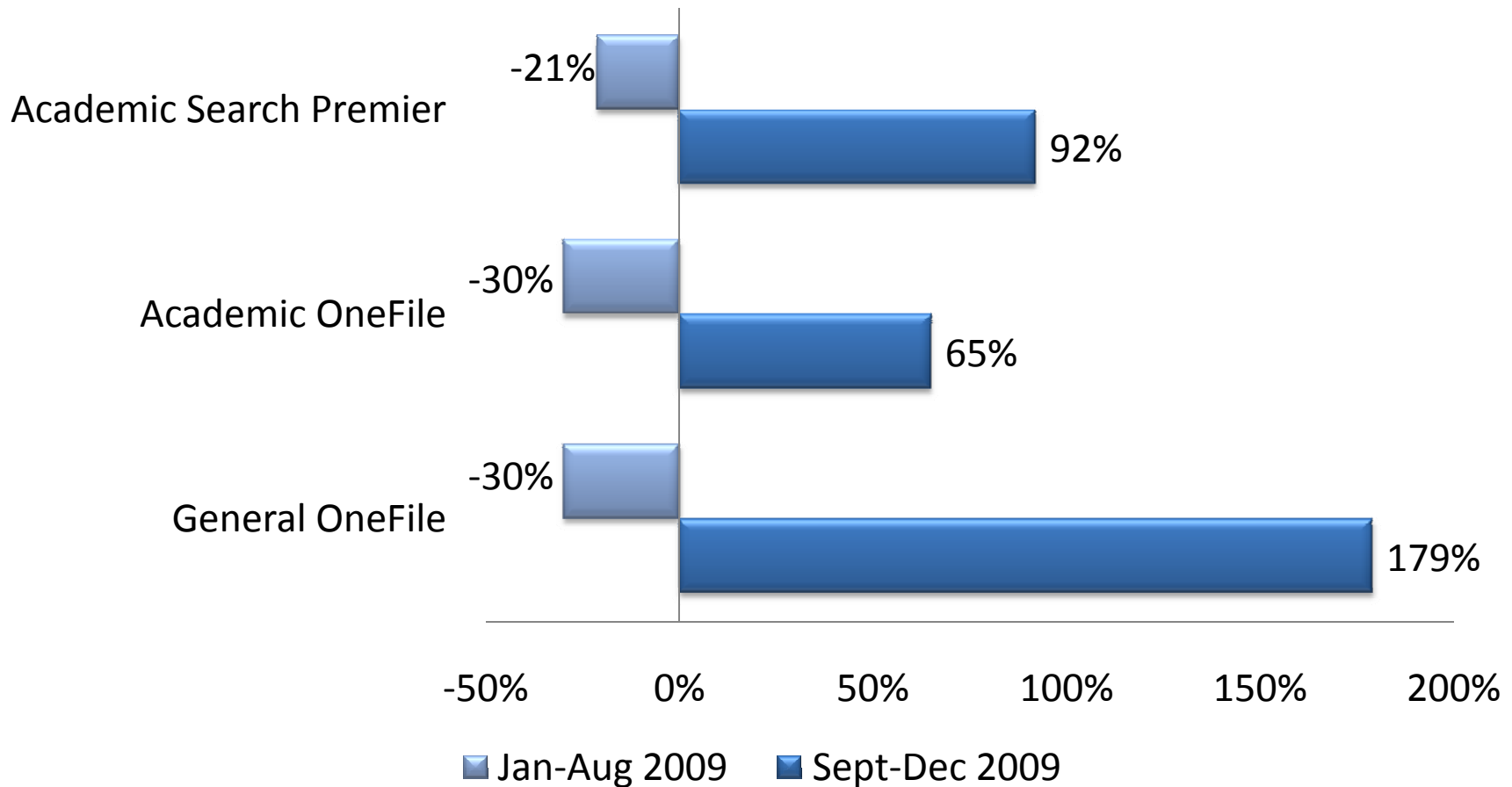

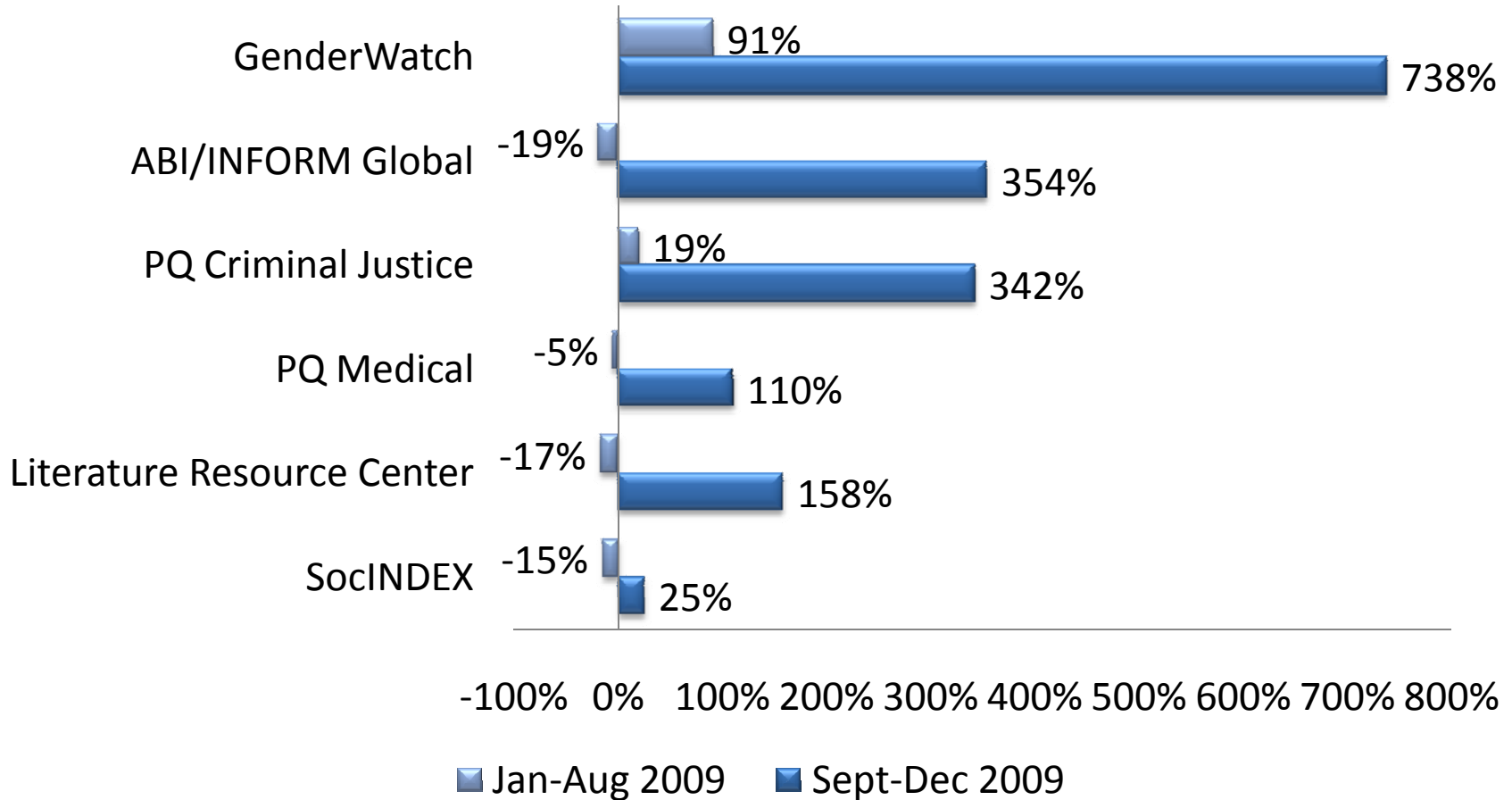

Aggregator Databases



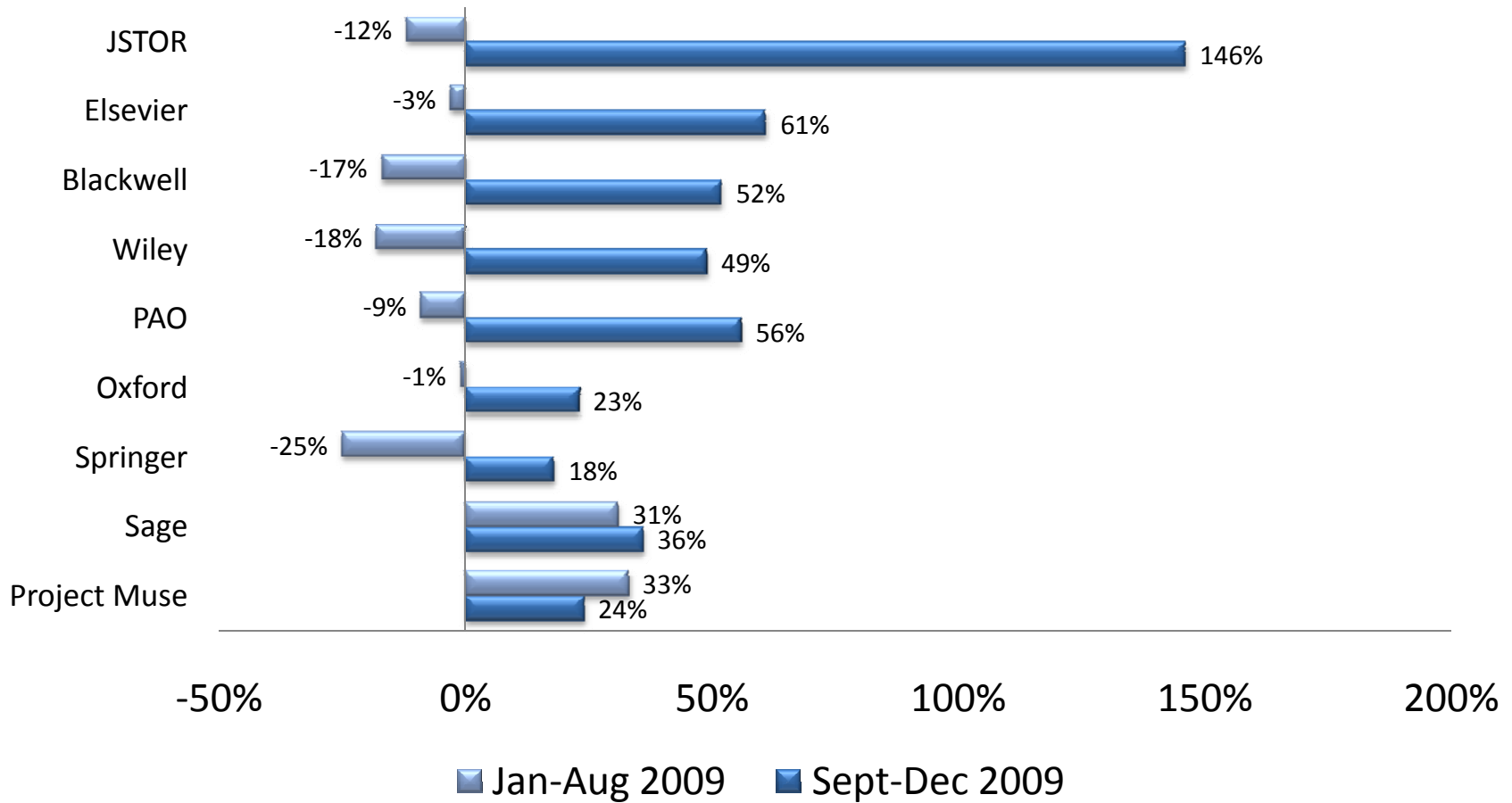

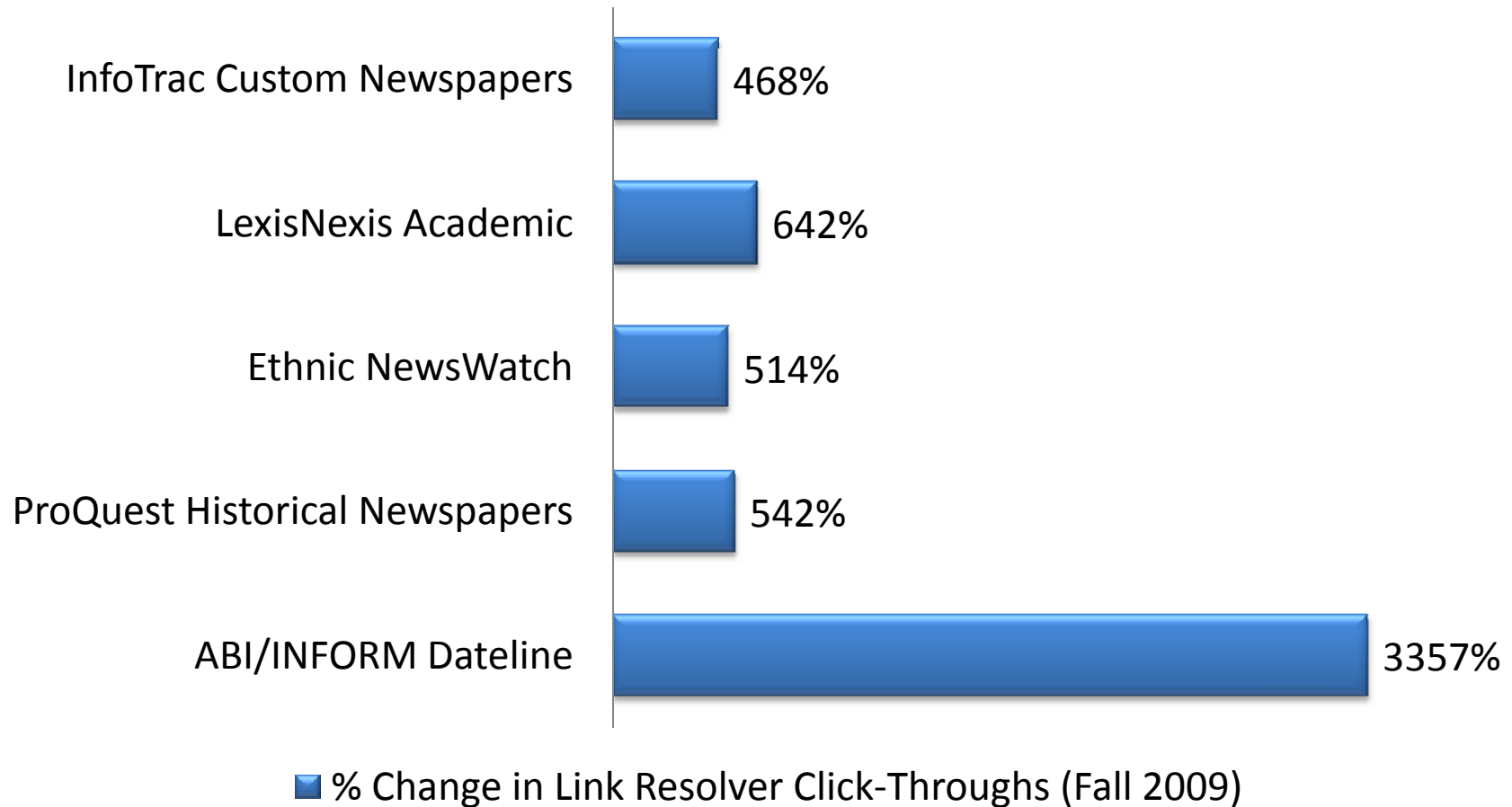

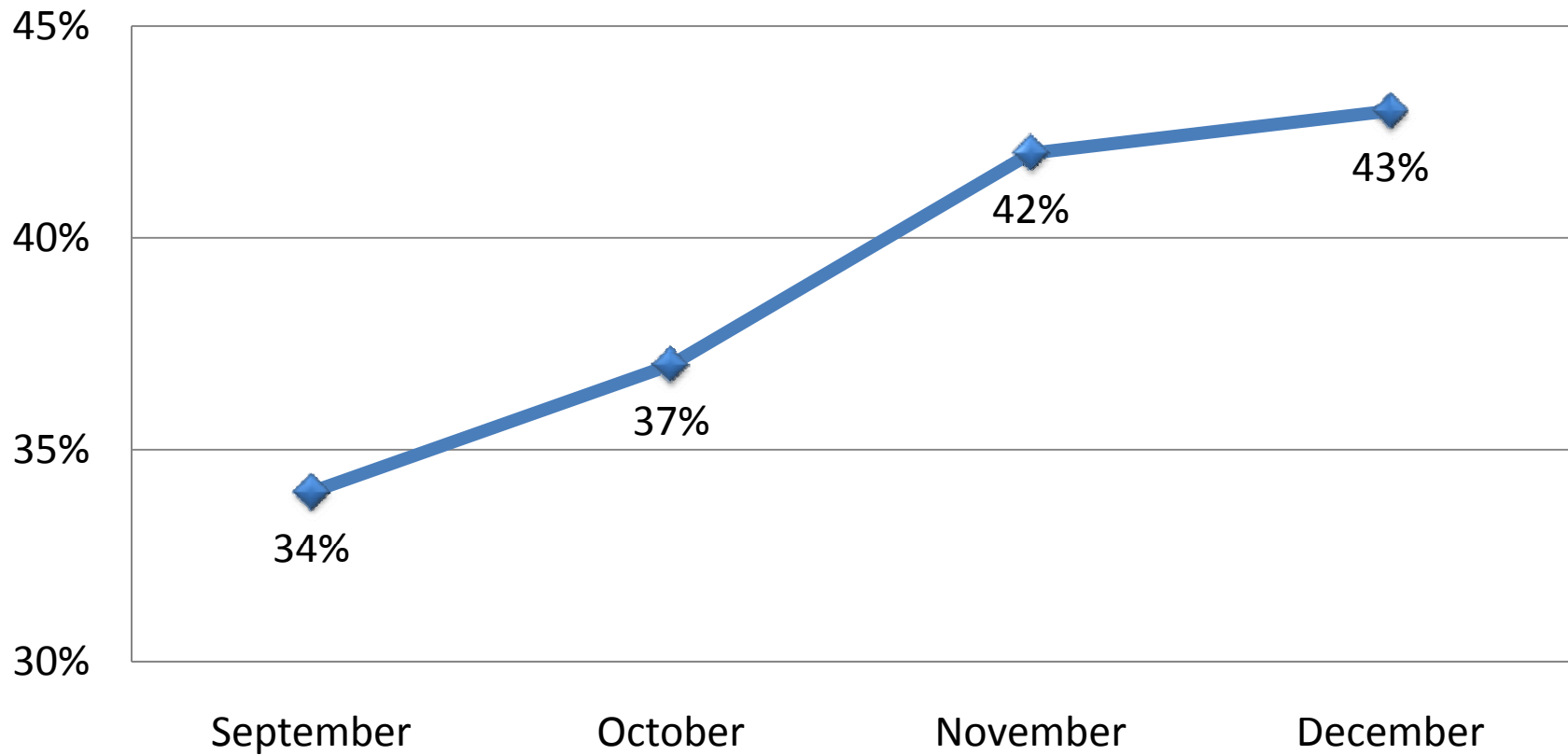

What's this all Mean?

- Summon had a major impact on user behavior last semester
- Users were able to connect to content even when provider was not a Summon partner (e.g. ASP, Elsevier and JSTOR)
- Perhaps contrary to librarian belief, there is a strong demand for newspaper content, which Summon meets
- Users identified and connected to book content through Summon
- Users seem to be selecting book reviews at a higher rate than we would expect
- We need to identify how to connect users to Summon ***and to core subject databases***
 - Make core databases and Summon stand out and stand apart
 - Make it seamless to the user
