MOVE TO LOUTIT HALL -- Equipment for the new science building ... which has been stored in various buildings all over campus ... will be loaded in trucks and cars and taken to Loutit Hall beginning December 20. The science faculty will supervise the installation of all equipment ... aided by a new member of the staff, science storeskeeper Jerry DeGroot. Labs will be ready for classes on January 5 ... but the 10,000 volumes for the science library will not be moved from Lake Superior Hall until the end of February. Slow delivery on bookshelves is the reason for delay.

REGISTRATION FOR WINTER QUARTER -- January 3 and 4 are dates for winter quarter registration. New students are reminded that health forms must be returned before a permit for registration can be issued.

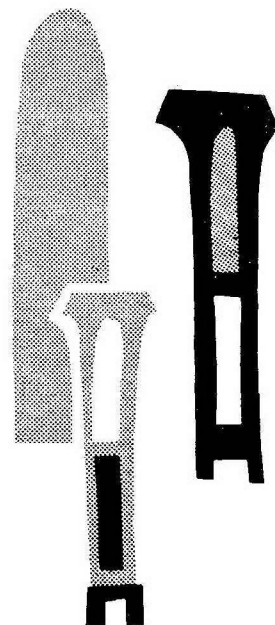
GIFTS FOR THE LIBRARY -- Two valuable collections have recently been presented to the library ... one is from Allan Willard of Grand Rapids and the other from the Bollingen Foundation of New York City. Mr. Willard's collection ... that was accumulated by his father ... includes significant examples of private presses and fine printing in the United States.

The Bollingen Foundation ... which underwrites scholarly and art publications ... is sending us 100 volumes, worth approximately \$1,000. Among the books are complete sets of the Andrew W. Mellon lectures in Fine Arts, given at the National Gallery in Washington, D. C. and of the record of the archaeological excavations at Samothrace.

COLLEGIATE CENTER -- Low bidders for construction of the second collegiate center were approved by the Board of Control at its November meeting. Excavation has been started for this new building.

NAMES WANTED -- There are many new building now under construction or in planning stages ... and all designated by number rather than name. Do you have suggestions for names for four dormitories, the collegiate center to be located near them, and the academic complex that shares the same plateau? HOUSING - '66 -- Applications for next fall are running better than 100% over last year ... and a good share of new students are interested in housing on or near the campus. Those of you who wish to live in the new college dormitory ... which houses 100 men and 100 women ... should get your bids in early.



Newest off-campus facilities will be the Campus View Apartments ... located on 42nd Avenue just south of the campus. Two three-story buildings are planned ... to house 180 students in one- and two-bedroom apartments.

MEET MR. BLUESTONE -- New member of the Board of Control is Irving Bluestone ... administrative assistant to United Auto Workers president Walter P. Reuther since 1961. Mr. Bluestone received his AB from the City College of New York and spent a post-graduate year of study at the University of Bern, Switzerland.

An expert in negotiations and collective bargaining, Mr. Bluestone was appointed to the national staff of the union in 1947 after serving with locals in New Jersey. He was appointed by Governor Romney as vice-chairman of the Blue Ribbon Committee on Higher Education and is a member of the State Human Resources Council. Mr. Bluestone is married and the father of three children ... lives in Detroit. He is the first new board member appointed since GVSC's founding, and he fills the vacancy created by the expiration of the term of Kenneth Robinson, now a member of the State Civil Rights Commission.

TEN O'CLOCK SCHOLAR -- Beginning Wednesday, January 5, over WOOD-TV (Channel 8) GVSC presents a 16-weeks series on International Relations. The 10 a.m. programs will feature members of the political science and economics departments ... with Dean George Potter as an added attraction ... in a look at "The World in Crisis." Two panel discussions will be part of the series ... and your questions on any aspect of foreign policy are invited for presentation to the panel.

TEACHERS AIDS FOR THE WINTER QUARTER -- Under GVSC's plan for teacher preparation ... 29 students will be teachers aids in 17 different area high schools, and 11 will be serving in 8 junior highs. They will be spending half of each school day during the winter quarter learning first-hand what teaching is like at the junior high and secondary levels. Their subject areas include history, social studies, English, math and biology ... and accompanying seminars on-campus will relate their experiences to course work.

In the spring, other secondary school aids will work in math and German ... and candidates for elementary school certification will work at that level. Students who are completing their elementary school teachers aid time this quarter are unanimous in calling the program a valuable experience. One says, "I never realized teachers had so much to do," but for all of them the desire to enter the teaching profession has been reinforced.

ON EXHIBITION -- Art exhibits scheduled for display in Seidman House in January include the works of Sister Mary Lois, O.P., assistant professor of art at Aquinas College art department ... and a photographic exhibit from the French embassy in New York ... sponsored by GVSC's La Societe Francaise and the Grand Rapids French Society ... of "The French in America."

TOWN AND GOWN COMMITTEE -- Charter for the Town and Gown committee ... established to maintain harmonious relationships between the college and nearby communities ... has been signed by representatives of GVSC and Allendale city fathers. Invitations to join the committee are being sent to township boards, service clubs, school boards, churches, and other organizations having an interest in the college and the community. The Town and Gown committee will constitute a forum for discussion ... and members will report back to their organizations for appropriate action.
