## Headcount and Credits Up From Last Summer

Preliminary summer registration figures for Grand Valley show that 2,803 students have enrolled for classes, an 8 percent increase over last year's total of

## FILMMAKERS WIN FESTIVAL HONORS

Grand Valley, and William James College in particular, was well-represented among the winners of the film competition held in conjunction with Festival '81 in Grand Rapids. Of the eleven persons who won awards or received honorable mentions, eight were associated with Grand Valley.

William James College faculty member Deanna Morse won the best of show award for her animated film "Charleston Home Movie." Top prizes in their categories were awarded to WJC students Chuck Peterson for best animation and Kris Twa for creative use of media. WJC graduate Dave Suwal was awarded best documentary honors for a film for which sound was produced by Kirkhof College student Chuck Foley.

Suwal and another WJC graduate, Pat Bridges, along with WZZM-TV cameraperson Dan Tomaszewski, produced the film which won best multi-media award.

Honorable mention for the best plotted film went to a former Grand Valley audio-visual department employee, Scott Vanderberg.

2,580. An even larger increase is reflected in semester credit hours, which currently stand at 17,342, a 25 percent jump from last year's 13,855.

The figures reflect a departure from recent trends toward higher headcounts but a lower average credit load per student.

The average load for undergraduate students in the College of Arts and Sciences this summer is 7.5 credits, compared to 5.8 credits last summer.

An important factor in the increase in credit hour figures is the broader selection of courses available this summer, according to Registrar Lynn Bresky.

"Last year, because of the conversion from quarters to semesters, we had an eight-week summer session. This year students could select from courses offered for a full 12-week session or for either or both of the two six-week sessions," Bresky said.

As a result of the increase in credit hours, summer tuition revenues may be slightly over the targeted figures, according to James Starkweather, director of budgets.

Official enrollment figures will be available at the end of August after all summer workshop registrations have taken place.

## United Stage Performs in Mall, Parks and at Smithsonian

Theatre instructor Robert Moyer is directing "Matinees on the Mall," a series of mid-day entertainment programs being offered at the Monroe Mall in downtown Grand Rapids through August 7. The core company of performing artists for the series is United Stage.

Working with Moyer on the project are several Grand Valley students, including Matt Robison, Kimberly Bazzy, John Wallace, Meggin Grossman, Allison Young and June Crocker.

The matinee programs are offered between 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Entertainment ranges from circus clowns to brass bands, with a different theme each day. Last week, for example, one pro-

gram focused on the needs of the handicapped, with arts for and by the handicapped.

Matinees on the Mall is the second series of performances in Grand Rapids in which United Stage has been featured this summer. The company recently ended a schedule of twelve performances in six Grand Rapids area parks as part of the Grand Rapids Recreation Department's Theatre in the Parks program.

Later this year, the group is scheduled to travel to Washington D.C. to present a performing art series for children at the Smithsonian Institution, where the company will be in residence during the month of November.

## Athletic Department Taking Football Ticket Orders

Season tickets for Grand Valley's 1981 football games can be ordered now from the intercollegiate athletic department. The tickets are for reserved seats in the two sections directly in front of the press box. A total of 768 season tickets

are available, according to Dan Karpanty, assistant to the director of intercollegiate athletics.

Last year's season buyers who ordered their 1981 tickets by June 15 automatically received the same seat location, Karpanty said, and new season orders will be filled in the best available section with a guaranteed renewal privilege for 1982. Tickets will be mailed around August 15.

The 1981 Laker season includes five home games. Season tickets cost \$23 for reserved seats and \$18 for general seating. Costs for faculty and staff are \$20 for reserved seats and \$15 for general tickets. Individual game prices are \$5 for reserved seats, \$4 for general seats and \$2 for student tickets.

Although no refunds will be made to persons who are unable to use their tickets to a particular game, the tickets may be turned in before the game for a tax deductible gift.

## AthleticFieldWorkUnderway

Grand Valley's football team will play its 1981 home games in the Arend D. Lubbers Stadium but ongoing work on Grand Valley's athletic fields will force the Lakers to practice on a field north of Kistler House.

Work on the athletic fields started in June and is expected to be completed this fall. However, the fields will not be available for use until the fall of 1982.

When completed they will include four lighted softball fields that will also be used for intramural touch football; a regulation softball diamond for women's softball and physical education classes; two additional, lighted tennis courts, one with a rebound board; a golf driving range and putting green for instructional use; and fields for throwing the hammer, discus and javelin.
