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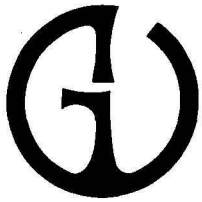

EVENING CLASSES -- A new program of evening courses will be offered at Grand Valley for the winter term, beginning Jan. 4. No admissions credentials will be needed to register for these courses, and registration papers may be picked up at the first class session. An "evening student" may apply for regular admission to the college for a degree program by filing with the Admissions office. Courses to be offered are: Economics 418, Personnel, Tues. and Thurs.; Psychology 201, Introduction to Psychology, Mon. and Wed.; Psychology 304, Psychology of the Exceptional Child, Mon. and Wed.; and Sociology 320, Juvenile Delinquency, Tues. and Thurs. All classes meet from 7 to 9 p.m.

The psychology and sociology courses will be taught by GVSC professors Dr. Charles Greenshields, Mr. James Lundy, and Mr. John Vonk; Mr. John Randall, vice-president of Rapistan, Inc., will teach the personnel class.

Anyone in the GVSC area with a college degree and considering work toward teacher certification would find a good start with the Psych. 201 course.

ORIGINAL GVSC BOARD MEMBER DIES -- Mrs. John J. (Grace) Kistler died Nov. 18 at Hackley Hospital, Muskegon, following a brief illness. She was appointed a member of the

GVSC Board of Control by Governor Williams in 1960. Besides her interest in the college, Mrs. Kistler had been active in many community, state and national organizations, both in Michigan and in Missouri, where she and her husband resided until moving to Grand Haven in 1940. Mr. Kistler, who was office manager of Challenge Machinery Co., died in 1963.

Mrs. Kistler's family requested that any memorials be made to a scholarship fund in her honor at Grand Valley. President Zumberge stated, "Mrs. Kistler was a staunch supporter of Grand Valley since the days when the college was first proposed. She was the spark that fired her community to its high level of support of GVSC and had been a loyal and stimulating member of the college board of control since its beginning. The scholarship fund in her name is a fitting memorial to her interest in Grand Valley and her concern with education."

FALL TERM GRADUATION -- Twenty-five GVSC students, candidates for the baccalaureate degree, will be honored at a reception at the college on Dec. 6. Nineteen are candidates for the B.A. degree, and six for the B.S. degree. Seven are also candidates for elementary teaching certification, and five for secondary teaching certification.

CONGRATULATIONS TO -- Philip Kolody, assistant professor of history, who recently received the Ph.D degree in history from Princeton University. To Howard Stein, associate professor of biology, who has been awarded an N.S.F. academic year extension grant to continue work on the project he began last summer in the Research Participation for College Teachers at Ann Arbor. The project involves glutamic acid metabolism in tobacco roots.

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY DRIVE -- GVSC volunteers ... 147 of them ... marched for the Muscular Dystrophy drive Nov. 14. They covered areas in Grand Rapids, Cascade, Forest Hills, and Rockford ... collected \$1,319.63.

PRESIDENT'S ROUND TABLE -- Dec. 5, 20 representatives of GVSC student groups ... residents, commuters, newspaper, government, etc. ... met with college administrators at dinner for an open discussion of student ideas, problems, and concerns.

MUSIC, THEATRE, AND ART NEWS -- The GVSC Concert Band, under the direction

of Daniel Kovats, presented a concert entitled, "Musique de la Garde Republicaine" at the college on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 3. Dean Arthur C. Hills appeared as guest conductor, and assistant professor of French, Jean M. Lanniel narrated the program.

On Dec. 10, the GVSC Singers, with featured guest instrumentalists and vocalists, plans to present a cantata service taken from Bach's music at the Immanuel Lutheran Church in Grand Rapids. The service is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. The large baroque organ of the Immanuel Church will lend authenticity to the program.

Grand Valley College Theatre presented Richard B. Sheridan's 18th century comedy of manners, "The Rivals" for five performances ... November 15, 16, 17, and 18 ... at the college ... and a special performance November 20 at the Grand Haven Community Center.

There will be an exhibition of GVSC student art work beginning Monday, December 4, on the ground floor of Lake Superior Hall, and in the second floor design studio and ground floor of Lake Michigan Hall.

COMING EVENTS -- Grand Valley's Winter Carnival ... a week featuring ice sculpture, ski and beard contests, crowning of GVSC Winter Carnival queen at dance culminating the week ... is scheduled for January 28 through February 3.
