Character Education Conference Returns For Third Straight Year

The third annual West Michigan Character Education Conference is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 21, 2002, at the Eberhard Center in downtown Grand Rapids.

The day-long conference runs from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. and consists of 16 different breakout sessions, including an address by keynote speaker Dr. Jim Kern, author of "Build The Fort...Today."

Kern lectures audiences on how to help children change how they see the world and better understand themselves and others. He follows Hal Urban, the keynote speaker at the 2001 Continuing Education Conference.

Breakout sessions include the "ABC's of Building Character Education," "RESPECT," "Kids, Character and the Classroom," "Proud to Be An American" and "Building a School into a Community," among others.

Another breakout session, "Moral Stages of Development," uses ideas from Character Education guru Dr. Thomas Lickona about how to identify stages of moral development.

Applications Are Being Accepted For Study Abroad to New Zealand

A graduate study abroad program in New Zealand has been scheduled for the Summer of 2003.

During the three-week stay — from June 14 to July 5 — participants will attend lectures given at host universities of higher education, the Ministry of Education and various primary and secondary schools located on the North Island.

Reading students may focus on literacy, administrators investigate school organization and policies, technology students study their specialty and elementary, middle and high school teachers on their levels and subject areas, but all will participate on the study tour together. The common meetings permit varied insights and information to be shared and connected to each other.

Students will experience educational practices in Auckland, Hamilton, Rotorua and Wellington and be housed in a variety of ways,

including dormitories, hotels and at home stays with area faculty. Tours of the stunning New Zealand countryside — including a trip to the ancient Maori land of Rotorua — are also scheduled.

Academic credit may be earned for either Current Issues in Education (ED 671), Curriculum Development (ED 630), Comparative Education (EDG 680) or Research Application (695).

The approximate fee for the program — which includes round-trip fare from Grand Rapids, local transportation, housing and most meals, program fees and visits to schools and universities — is \$3,500.

Applications for the program are due by Jan. 10, 2003.
