I celebrate the privilege to lead the School of Education at Grand Valley State University. That framework includes:

- A newly crafted mission, vision and values statement

Our plans include the growing of our School of Education Alumni Association to help identify friends who can volunteer "time, talent and treasure." Additionally, we are working diligently to build a culture of grant writing that will help us further our S.O.E. mission and vision.

The third priority is a continued effort of

reaching out to our minority communities. Our plans include the fostering of an inclusive community by continued participation in diversity efforts, increased student participation in cultural awareness programming and the development of meaningful partnerships with minority organizations.

Our fourth priority is developing a technology plan that outlines S.O.E. intentions for replacing hardware, for outfitting faculty and staff with cutting edge software and for providing faculty with professional development to assist the integration of this potential into S.O.E. courses.

Fifth, we will create action plans in the area of professional development. Our goal is to ensure that we have adequate support mechanisms in place for quality professional development, to systematize a mentoring program with detailed procedures and policies and to host national speakers of interest to the S.O.E. and broad community.

Finally, our sixth priority is to continue challenging ourselves to exceed quality standards. Quality initiatives will foster collective support for the value of high expectations and of raising the bar. Our ultimate aim will be to raise expectations for our students and to examine all S.O.E. decisions in relation to excellence.

It is my hope that in the year ahead, we will create a comprehensive and thoughtful planning document with students at its core. Clearly, students are our ultimate priority. As such, I look forward to a great year full of opportunities to create plans, design strategies and implement ideas that will positively enhance student lives. Input Being Sought About GVSU Reorganization

As Grand Valley State University continues to proceed through its Reorganization Plan, requests for comments are being solicited.

In the proposed plan for reorganization, the School of Education will be replaced as the College of Education. The plan will put students in different majors under one umbrella, according to Dr. Linda McCrea, the School of Education's chair for Curriculum & Instruction.

The Reorganization Plan for the University places the School of Education as a College of Education, and will represent a broader educational focus, which includes CSAL, school counseling, educational leadership, technology, library media careers in addition to teaching.

The proposed plan facilitates more direct communication at the dean's level with all the major departments from which students receive their degrees.

"It won't change a lot about how we do things, but it sends a different message by providing a broader perspective," McCrea said. "We will be able to facilitate more direct communication for majors with one large unit in the College of Arts & Sciences.

"It will help streamline the way business gets done."
