SCHOOL COUNSELING PROGRAM IS SET TO BEGIN

The School of Education at GVSU will launch a new master's level school counseling

program beginning in 2004.

The Masters of Education in School Counseling program was endorsed and approved by the GVSU Board of Trustees in October, 2003. The first students will be formally admitted to the program beginning in the winter of 2004.

The School Counseling degree will allow graduates to work as school counselors in K-12

public, private and charter schools.

"There is a need on a national level for more school counselors, because it affects academic, career and personal development in our schools," said Claudia Sowa Wojciakowski, the School of Education's director of Community Outreach. "School counselors and programs have a substantial affect on students. We have developed educational programs with collaboration of administrators and teachers to assist students and student learning."

Sowa Wojciakowski said that there is a shortage of school counselors in the United States and the profession is expected to experience a faster growth rate than the average for other school related occupations until 2010.

Reading Marathon Tackles Tolkien's 'Lord of The Rings'

In an attempt to promote reading habits, the School of Education sought out hobbits to concoct a 24-hour "Lord of the Rings" marathon.

The journey took them every step of the way through Tolkien's trilogy of "The Fellowship of the Ring," "The Two Towers" and "The Return of the Ring."

Warm, sunny daytime temperatures and a spell-binding, bright, full moon created a near perfect setting for the reading "wizards," who
