FATHER, SON ARE GIANTS

Although the father and son took different career paths, both were honored as Giants in the community. Faite R-P Mack, Ph.D., school psychologist and graduate professor of education at Grand Valley State University, and his Faite R-P Mack father, retired Col. Faite



Mack Sr., received the prestigious honors during the 18th annual Giants Banquet Jan. 29 in

Grand Rapids.

It marked the first time in the history of the Giants Awards that a father and son had been honored simultaneously. The younger Mack received the Hattie Beverly Education Giant Award. Retired Col. Faite Mack Sr., a former Tuskegee Airman with the Fighting 99th — the first squadron of black combat fighter pilots in World War II — received the Giant Among Giants Award, presented for his community service efforts.

The Giants Awards are presented annually by the Grand Rapids Community College Foundation.

"I thought that was very much an honor," said Mack, a member of the GVSU School of Education for over 25 years.

A PREVIEW OF THINGS TO COME



■ hese are exciting times for the School of Education as we expand the scope of our mission toward educating educators for the future. Following are several initiatives that are available to you - friends, alumni and colleagues - of GVSU's School of Education.

Grand Valley State University Alumni Society. The first teacher education graduating class at Grand Valley was in 1967, nearly 33 years ago. From a very small but innovative teacher education unit, the School of Education at GVSU has matured into the fastest growing producer of K-12 educators in Michigan and one of the fastest growing in the country. The undergraduate teacher education program has doubled over the last four years, and the School of Education's graduate program is the largest graduate program at the

All of our older sister universities have established School of Education Alumni Societies. I believe the time is right to launch the GRAND VALLEY STATE UNIVERSI-TY ALUMNI SOCIETY.

Fall Lecture Series. The third Fall Education Lecture Series will explore the future of urban schools. Invited speakers include David Adamany, superintendent of the Detroit Schools; Martin Haberman from University of Wisconsin and founder of the Star Teacher Program for preparing outstanding urban teachers; Robert Slavin, developer of the Success for All Reading Program, which has provided early reading success for urban students; and Paul Vallas, ČEO of the Chicago Public Schools, credited with creating the greatest turnaround ever in a large urban school district. Character Education Conference. The inaugural Character Education Conference is scheduled for November 29, 2000, at the Eberhard Center. An outgrowth of the Fall 1999 Lecture Series which had the theme of Character Education in the Classroom, a group of lecture series attendees have formed a strategic planning task force to lay the groundwork for Michigan's first Schools and Communities of Character Conference. The planning committee is made up of PK-12 teachers and administrators, university faculty and several members of the business community and area chambers of commerce. Dr. Thomas Lickona has agreed to be the keynote presenter.

Professor Lickona directs the Center for the 4th and 5th Rs at the State University of New York at Cortland. He is the leading national authority on Character Education and the author of the popular book, Educating for Character (Bantam Books). Details of this conference will be mailed to school districts.

International Student Teaching in South Africa will be launched in the winter of 2001. Professors Ram Chattulani, Julie Chlebo, Barbara Lubic and I traveled to Cape Town and Stellenbosch, South Africa, during March. We visited 19 schools in five days and identified several appropriate sites for pre-student teaching and teaching assisting. The School of Education hopes to provide this experience for 15-20 students each winter. One GVSU professor will accompany these students and team up with a professor from a South African university to provide the field supervision. The fee for this experience will include round trip airfare, room and board with a South African family and a generous allocation for travel and sight seeing. Cape Town is regarded as the most multi-cultural city in the world. It is also one of the most beautiful cities in the world.

Distinguished Visiting Professor of Education Harold Herman is to be in residence for the academic year 2000/2001. Professor Herman is an internationally known expert in comparative international education and brings to GVSU an extensive knowledge of multi-cultural education. Professor Herman will be accompanied by his wife Marcia, his son Kurt - who will be a GVSU student in business information systems — and his daughter Hayley, who will be a high school senior. The Herman family will make a significant, positive contribution to the Greater Grand Valley Community.

School Counselor Master's Degree Requested. The Michigan School Counselor Association has requested that the GVSU School of Education initiate a School Counselor Master's Degree. The increasing shortage of school counselors has created a crisis in the state of Michigan. With funding support from the Provost's office and from Vice Provost Robert Fletcher, I am actively seeking a veteran faculty member/consultant from a well-established and respected university school counseling program to assist in developing a master's program, writing syllabi and preparing the program for the governance process.
